## Judge: no abuse of power in appointment

### IBARRA RULES MAYOR, COUNCIL HAD DISCRETION TO PUT LEITHEAD TODD IN ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT POSITION

Environmental Management Director Bobby Jean Leithead Todd can keep her job, following a judge's ruling that the mayor and County Council had

discretion to put her in the position without the engineering degree seemingly required by the county charter.

Former South Kona/Ka'u Councilwoman Brenda Ford filed the lawsuit in 2013, saying Leithead Todd doesn't meet the minimum qualifications for

the job, as set by charter. Ford, represented by attorney Michael Matsukawa, cited the charter's requirement that the Environmental Management director hold "an engineering degree or a degree in a related field." Leithead Todd, an

attorney, holds a bachelor's degree in English.

Kona attorney Robert Kim, representing Leithead Todd, had argued the mayor is vested with the power to appoint. Kim also pointed to the council, which has checks and balances over the decision of the mayor. The council confirmed Leithead Todd based upon the legal opinion of then corporation counsel, Lincoln Ashida, who told council members that they have the discretion to determine what

"related field" meant.

3rd Circuit Court Judge Ronald Ibarra noted in his 15-page ruling Tuesday that both sides had agreed the charter language is ambiguous. Ibarra also agreed with that, but he said because Ford's side did not meet its burden of proof that Mayor Billy Kenoi or the council abused its discretion, then he need not rule on whether a law degree is a degree "in a related

## Sale not expected to effect operations

South-Korea based Mirae Asset has purchased the Fairmont Orchid, Hawaii hotel in South Kohala, but with the management of the business slated to remain the same, the public may not know the difference.

Staffing, programs, and the general look of the 538-room luxury resort will remain

status quo, said Jaisy Jardine, the hotel's director of public relations.

The company was unwilling to disclose the details of the transaction; however, Pacific Business News reported the sale closed in mid-May for \$200.3 million.

"Fairmont will continue to manage the property under a long-term management contract and we look forward to welcoming guests for the distinctive experience they are

accustomed to at the Fairmont Orchid, Hawaii," Jardine said. "The hotel will continue to be a valued member of the Fairmont Hotels & Resorts portfolio, with all the services, amenities and programs that this entails."

Cassie Nam, a spokesperson for Mirae, said the investment company has been trying to find a way into the Hawaii market for some time, because of the state's positioning, reputation and stability

as a destination, and growing demand from regions all around the Pacific.

"Specifically, Mirae believes the Big Island has not fully realized its potential and Fairmont is well positioned in the market to fully benefit if such potential is realized," Nam said in an email.

Mirae manages \$70 billion in assets and bills itself as one of the world's most prominent emerging market investors, with offices in 12 countries.

## Big Island unemployment continues downward trend

The employment picture on the Big Island continued to slowly brighten in April, bearing out forecasts of a steady increase in jobs statewide into at least the first quarter of 2016.

Unemployment in Hawaii County edged down from 4.9 percent in March to 4.8 percent in April, the fifth consecutive month of declines, according to figures released this week by the state Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.

Preliminary data shows Hawaii Island adding 400 service sector jobs, and the trade, transportation and utilities sector adding 200 jobs in April. Wholesale trade and retail trade each added 100 jobs as well, and government jobs increased by 200. These gains were offset by the loss of 500 jobs in the leisure and hospitality sector.

Hawaii County still holds the highest unemployment rate among the four counties, with 81,750 people in the workforce but another 4,150 lacking jobs.

The construction sector is set to receive a significant shot in the arm over the next several years. Poised to boost that sector are the widening of the Queen Kaahumanu Highway from Kealahou Parkway to Kona International Airport — a \$100 million project that transportation officials are optimistic

### Islamic State suicide bombs kill 17 troops

BAGHDAD — As Iraqi forces gathered for a major new offensive to try to take back the sprawling Sunni heartland of Anbar province, Islamic State militants struck first, unleashing a wave of suicide bombings that killed at least 17 soldiers.

The attacks outside the extremist-held city of Fallujah came just hours after the Iraqi government announced the start of a wide-scale operation to recapture areas under Islamic State control in the vast desert province that stretches to the border with Jordan.

The militants used a sandstorm that engulfed most of Iraq to launch the deadly wave of bombings late Tuesday night. Brig. Gen. Saad Maan Ibrahim, the spokesman for the Joint Military Command, told The Associated Press.

### Nebraska abolishes death penalty

LINCOLN, Neb. — Nebraska abolished the death penalty on Wednesday over the governor's objections in a move pushed through the Legislature with unusual backing from conservatives who oppose capital punishment.

Senators in the one-house Legislature voted 30-19 to override Gov. Pete Ricketts, a Republican who supports the death penalty. The vote makes Nebraska the first traditionally conservative state to eliminate the punishment since North Dakota in 1973.

### AP sources: IRS believes identity thieves from Russia

WASHINGTON — IRS investigators believe the identity thieves who stole the personal tax information of more than 100,000 taxpayers from an IRS website are part of a sophisticated criminal operation based in Russia, two officials told the Associated Press.

The information was stolen as part of an elaborate scheme to claim fraudulent tax refunds, IRS Commissioner John Koskinen told reporters. Koskinen declined to say where the crime originated.

But two officials briefed on the matter said Wednesday the IRS believes the criminals were in Russia, based on computer data about who accessed the information. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to publicly discuss the ongoing criminal investigation.

# New federal rules on stream protection hailed, criticized

WASHINGTON — New federal rules designed to better protect small streams, tributaries and wetlands — and the drinking water of 117 million Americans — are being criticized by Republicans and farm groups as going too far.

The White House says the rules, issued Wednesday, will provide much-needed clarity for

will send "landowners, small businesses, farmers, and manufacturers on the road to a regulatory

and economic hell." The rules, issued by the Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, aim to clarify which smaller waterways fall under federal protection after two Supreme Court rulings left the reach of the Clean Water Act uncertain.

EPA Administrator Gina McCarthy said the waters affected would be only those with a "direct and significant" connection to larger bodies of water downstream that

are already protected.

The Supreme Court decisions in 2001 and 2006 left 60 percent of the nation's streams and millions of acres of wetlands without clear federal protection, according to EPA, causing confusion for landowners and government officials.

The new rules would kick in and force a permitting process only if a business or landowner took steps to pollute or destroy covered waters.

# BASE jumpers pushed to remote, no-rules sites

BOISE, Idaho — BASE jumpers, by nature, just want to be free.

Their sport is inherently death-defying, growing at the bleeding edge of high-risk extreme sports, and they tend to be hostile to any attempt at containing their passion.

In the U.S., their devil-may-care culture has been pushed out of urban areas, national parks and anywhere else where limits are imposed. Jumpers flock instead to the few remote areas hungry enough for tourist revenue to let them do their thing. Some say their outlaw status makes one of the world's most dangerous sports even more risky, and needs to change.

"BASE jumping isn't a crime," argues Alan Lewis of Knoxville, Tenn., who was skydiving before he tried BASE jumping 10 years ago. "It's not allowed in most places, so we're faced with having to trespass or do jumps at night, which isn't as safe. I think we're kind of getting frustrated at the whole situation."

BASE jumping — which stands for jumping not from planes, but from fixed locations including buildings, antenna, spans or Earth — has produced stunning online videos of people parachuting from buildings and wingsuit fliers zooming shockingly close to the treetops — mostly recorded outside the United States.

Many jumpers like the system in Europe, where BASE jumping follows some basic ground rules but jumpers assume all liability. This tolerance has opened new vistas, with jumps that have people soaring like never before,

using parachutes and even wingsuits, gliding for miles over breathtaking landscapes.

In Kjerag, Norway, jumpers must pay a registration fee and undergo an inspection before leaping off dramatic 3,200-foot cliffs. In Switzerland, BASE jumpers are required to have third-party liability insurance for all jumps, and some Swiss locations also urge purchasing a "landing card" to compensate farmers for any damage to their properties.

With very few places to try their sport legally in the U.S., a go-to hub for thrill-seekers is the I.B.

Perrine Bridge, stretching 486 feet above the Snake River as it winds through the Idaho desert. As cars whiz by, BASE jumpers from all over the world climb over the railing and step into this abyss, no permit, age limit or registration required.

Idaho law prohibits cities, counties and transportation officials from banning BASE jumping from bridges.

"If we did anything, like put up warning signs, we would actually increase our liability," said Nathan Jerke, spokesman for the Idaho Transportation Department.

The Twin Falls Chamber

of Commerce doesn't track BASE jumping visitors or tourism dollars, but officials say hundreds visit the town annually to jump from the bridge. The money they spend at hotels, restaurants and other spots in the town of 46,000 have become a big part of the local economy.

But their sport is being scrutinized again, with five people dying so far this year in the United States, including 73-year-old James E. Hickey, who set his parachute on fire while jumping off the Perrine bridge this month. His second chute didn't deploy.

Also this month, Carla Jean Segil, 26, was left

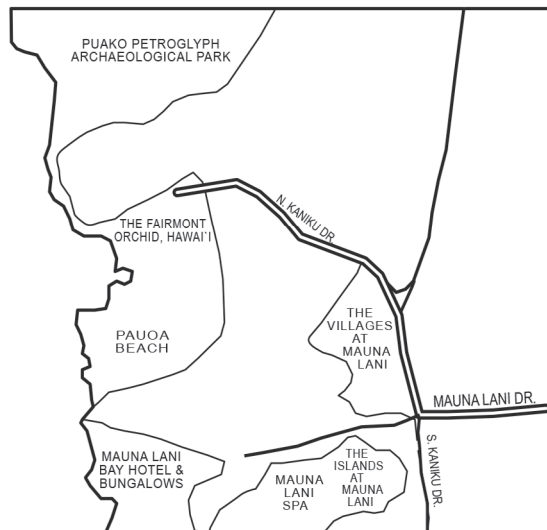
dangling 500 feet above the Snake River after a gust of wind blew her parachute into the bridge. She hung in the air for 40 minutes until a Twin Falls rescue crew pulled her up through a manhole.

Days before that, wingsuit fliers Dean Potter and Graham Hunt illegally jumped from a cliff as night fell in Yosemite National Park, then slammed into the sides of a narrow notch in a ridgeline about 15 seconds into their flight. These three joined hundreds who have died BASE jumping around the world, according to unofficial fatality lists kept by enthusiasts.

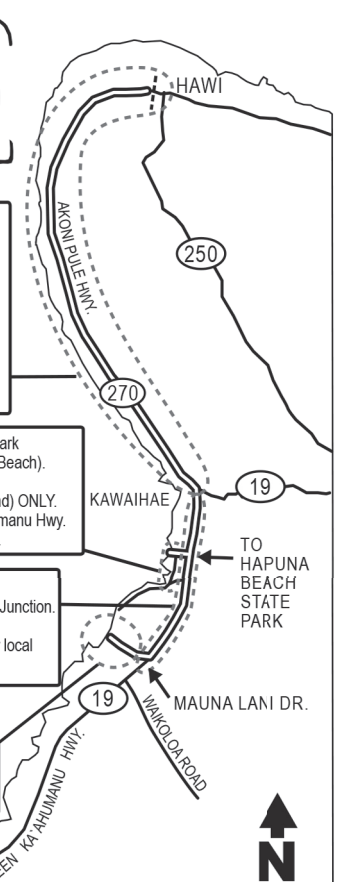

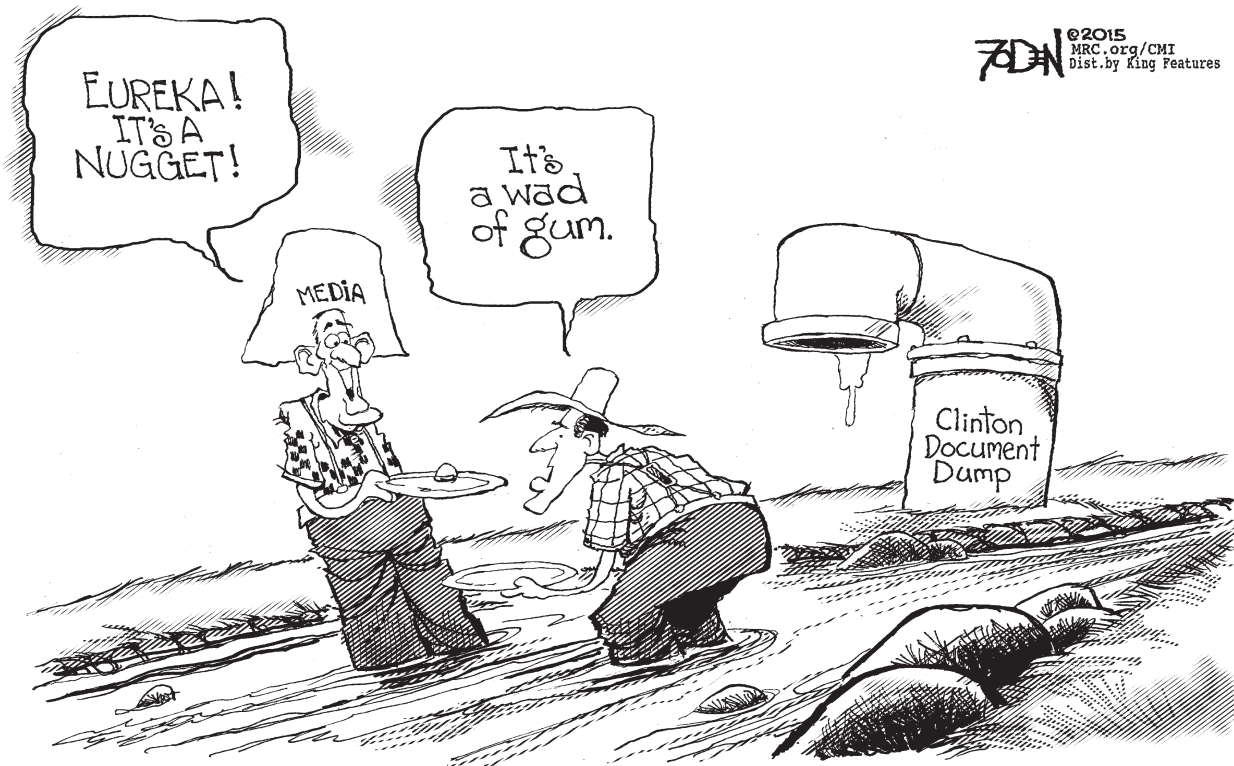
Thanks to everyone for making this event so wonderful.

## The separation of campaign and state

**W**ASHINGTON — A simple apology would suffice. Instead, campaign finance reformers, horrified by the predictable results of their handiwork, aspire to yet more regulatory wrinkles to limit political speech. These, too, would have consequences unintended and undesired by reformers, "requiring" a new round of reforms. But the Constitution, properly construed, requires a wall of separation between campaign and state.

Reformers detest the emergence of super PACs that fund advocacy supportive of, but not "coordinated" with, particular candidates. These vast reservoirs of money are, however, inevitable, reasonable and, on balance, wholesome responses to the reformers' attempts to combat what they call "too much money" in politics. Reformers have limited the amounts that can be contributed to parties and to candidates' campaigns, thereby limiting the quantity of political advocacy — aka speech.

To the surprise of no one familiar with political hydrology, money has flowed through crevices in our (fortunately) still porous society, into super PACs. Most political money funds the dissemination of political advocacy to influence elections, and Americans continue to exasperate reformers by finding new ways to speak about politics.

Reformers regret super PACs as a source of "outside" money. Greg Weiner



asks: Outside of what? Weiner, an Assumption College political scientist, wonders: Who decreed that campaigns are the private property of the two parties and their candidates? Today, parties and candidates welcome supportive super PACs as a necessity, given the reformers' regulatory regime. But parties and candidates would prefer to receive the money that goes to the super PACs, which can frustrate the parties' and candidates' desires to control America's political conversation.

Super PACs can annoy parties by enabling inconvenient candidates to compete in primaries and can annoy even candidates they favor by forcing certain issues into the campaign dialogue. So, Weiner argues, super PACs are new devices that actually restore something old — an era when "campaigns were communicative free-for-alls rather than regulated, top-down affairs." The First Amendment, which takes no cognizance of parties or candidates, hardly supports making them privileged, semi-exclusive conduits of the political conversations.

Reformers who resent the existence of super PACs, and the reformers' critics who oppose the reformers' regulations of politics that have made super PACs necessary, should ponder Bradley A. Smith's "Separation of Campaign and State" in The George Washington Law Review of November 2013. He argues not just that the quality of America's civic conversation would be improved by the deregulation of politics but also that the Constitution requires this because it contains no enumerated power authorizing Congress to regulate campaigning.

The Constitution speaks only of Congress' power to regulate the "time, place and manner" of elections. Congress has justified the regulation of political speech by conflating what Smith rightly says are two quite different things — campaigns and elections. Campaigns consist of speech and other activities to persuade the public to register particular decisions in elections. Elections are the formal processes by which those decisions are recorded.

The regulation of the quantity, content and timing of political speech is clearly unrelated to regulating an election's "time" or "place." Can Congress, however, wring an implied power to regulate political speech from the enumerated power to regulate the "manner" of elections? No.

The "manner" of an election includes modalities such as the keeping

of voter lists, designating polling places and counting votes. The Constitutional Convention's discussion of the times, places and manner clause, Smith notes, "revolved entirely around election administration" and referred "not at all to the process of seeking to persuade citizens to vote in one way or another."

"There is," he says, "no 'on' or 'off' switch on American politics"; campaigning is constant. Elections are occasional, discrete episodes. And "the fact that 'manner' was combined with 'times' and 'places' in the Constitution further suggests that it refers to the details of carrying out the formal process of voting." Listen, Smith says, to the logic of our language. "We do not talk about candidates making 'election stops' as they travel the country talking to voters, but rather 'campaign stops.' ... We have a 'campaign,' at the conclusion of which voters cast ballots on 'election day.'"

The phrase "a wall of separation between church and state" is from Thomas Jefferson, not the Constitution. But, says Smith, the metaphor's aptness "flows from the document's structure and purpose." So does the propriety of a wall between campaigns and government: It is simply impermissible for the government to regulate the debate that determines if the party controlling this or that portion of the government will retain control.

### Jobs, economic data still troubling

**T**he national unemployment rate ticked down slightly to 5.4 percent in April — a rate not seen since May 2008 — the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics recently reported. While this is welcome news, government statistics mask economic troubles that continue to plague millions of Americans years after the end of the last recession.

For starters, the

widely-reported "U-3" unemployment rate only includes those who are actively seeking employment. And more and more job-seekers are getting discouraged and giving up the job search altogether. This is why the unemployment rate has declined even as the civilian labor force participation rate has dropped significantly from its peak of 67.3 percent in 2000 to 62.8

percent today — hovering near a 37-year low.

The broader U-6 measure of unemployment, which includes those who want to work but have gotten so discouraged by their unsuccessful job search that they have given up, and those who want to work full-time but have had to settle for part-time work, remains double the U-3 rate, at 10.8 percent.

But even this does not provide the full unemployment picture. In 1994, the BLS stopped including long-term discouraged workers, who have been unemployed for more than a year, in its statistics. Reinserting this group would yield an unemployment rate of 23 percent, according to John Williams of ShadowStats.com.

A Harris Poll conducted

for Express Employment Professionals reveals the depths of would-be workers' despair, finding that fully 40 percent of those unemployed have given up looking for work.

For more than six years, increased government spending and the Federal Reserve's quantitative easing and zero interest-rate policies have failed to restore prosperity, succeeding only

in fostering more debt, reinflating the equity and housing bubbles for the next crash and destroying any incentives to save or eliminate malinvestments.

Until these monetary and fiscal policies are reversed, expect more boom-and-bust business cycles, more erosion of lower- and middle-class wealth and more massaged government statistics.

# Forecasters: Tropical depression expected to form off Mexico's west coast

A tropical depression was expected to form late Wednesday or early today off the coast of Mexico, forecasters with the Miami-based National Hurricane Center said Wednesday evening.

Showers and thunderstorms associated with the area of low pressure located about 700 miles south-southwest of Manzanillo, Mexico, continued to show signs of organization, forecasters said. The weather system was moving toward the west-northwest around 10 to 15 mph.

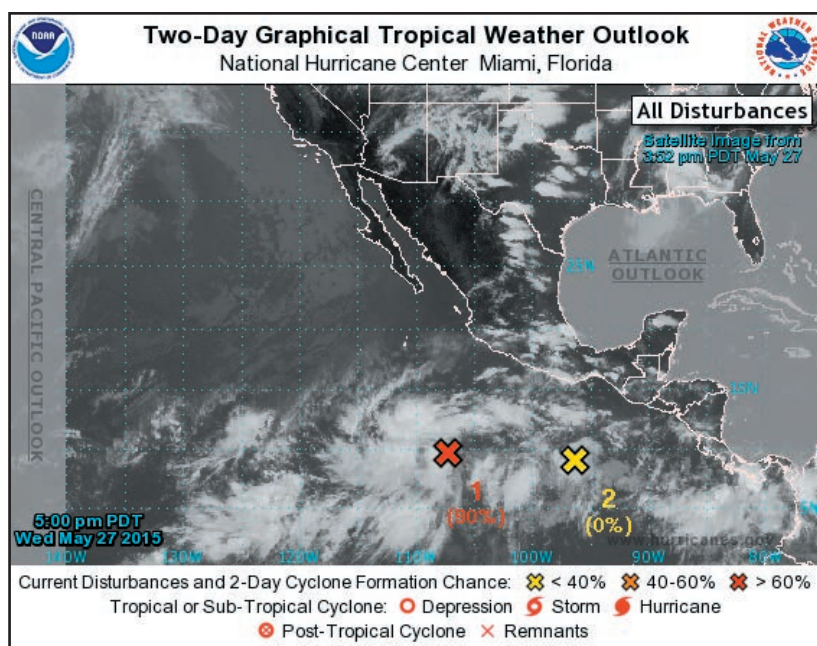
Environmental conditions were expected to remain conducive for development and a

tropical depression was expected to form no later than today. A tropical depression has maximum sustained winds of 38 mph.

Should the storm be the first to form within the Eastern Pacific basin, it will be named "Andres."

Forecasters were also monitoring an area of disturbed weather located several hundred miles south of the Gulf of Tehuantepec associated with a tropical wave. Environment conditions could become more favorable for some development of this system by the weekend as it moves slowly toward the west-northwest.

The Central Pacific hurricane season runs from June 1 to Nov. 30. The Eastern Pacific hurricane season began May 15.

field" to engineering.

"In viewing the evidence in the light most favorable to the petitioner, the petitioner has not raised or presented any evidence that there exists a genuine issue of material fact relating to whether the County Council or the mayor abused their discretion in interpreting the charter," Ibarra said in his order.

Kenoi praised the ruling.

"We appreciate Judge Ibarra's thoughtful and well reasoned decision. We believe it is the correct decision and we were confident that both the executive and legislative branches of county government had the discretion to approve a nominee and determine if their qualifications were appropriate," Kenoi said Wednesday. "I want to thank Bob Kim for his outstanding advocacy and for work of the Office of the Corporation Counsel."

Ibarra quoted extensively from the transcripts of the 2009-2010 Charter Commission in forming his ruling. The

commission had debated what kind of degree would be related to engineering, and then decided not to make it more specific but to leave it to the County Council's interpretation.

"Needless to say, we're very happy with the ruling," Kim said.

Matsukawa had not seen the ruling Wednesday afternoon and deferred comment until after he read it.

Leithead Todd held the director job under a previous mayor before the charter language was changed. She left that post to head the Planning Department under Kenoi, from 2009 until December 2013, when she returned to Environmental Management.

The County Council, by a 6-3 vote, confirmed the appointment that year. Ford, North Kona Councilwoman Karen Eoff — who had served as staff for the Charter Commission that added the ballot language — and Kohala Councilwoman Margaret Wille voted no.

The administrative offices of the Boys and Girls Club of the Big Island in Hilo were targeted early Friday morning in yet another in a long line of recent burglaries.

But this time, the non-profit had a trick up its sleeve: Brand new security cameras captured the thief in the act, and the club is now appealing to the public for help in identifying the suspect.

Situated on Kamakahonu Street, between Haili and Ponahawai streets, the building has a back door that lately has attracted plenty of unwanted attention from thieves, said Zavi Brees-Saunders, the club's chief professional officer.

"We've had a number of break-ins," she said Wednesday. "In November and December we had four in a monthlong period. And this one (Friday morning's break-in) is the second one this calendar year, and it was through that same door. We did not have cameras up the first times. We had an alarm system and a guard coming around, being active at night. But we've had a lot of traffic coming through here."

The burglar broke down the back door, which isn't very visible from the street and other buildings in the area, Brees-Saunders said, and proceeded to make off with items valued at a total of about \$1,000.

"He took our projector that we use for lessons and programming for the youth. It's the only one we own in the organization," she said. "And he took our credit card machine, a piggy bank, which was empty — we don't keep any valuables in here anymore — and most interestingly, he took a new yoga mat."

Boys and Girls Club administrators and the police were alerted immediately after the alarm sounded, Brees-Saunders said, but when the police arrived, the perpetrator had already left.

"The police did a great job with this last one," she said. "They were on site within 10 minutes, but (the burglary) had already been completed."

The crook did, however, leave behind a security camera video of himself as he made his way through the building. The man appears to be wearing a mask, as well as long, baggy shorts and

sneakers, with a white, long-sleeved "Tapout" shirt and white stocking cap with a bill.

He carried a bag and a flashlight and is shown moving from room to room, at one point returning to the main office with the yoga mat rolled up and slung over his shoulder. Before leaving, he turned down the lights and exited from the way he came. The whole video lasts about three minutes and 45 seconds.

Police took a report and initiated an investigation, according to Hawaii Police Department Lt. Robert Fujitake Jr., but there wasn't much more information he could provide about the latest break-in.

Police records, however, revealed six other reports involving the building going back to Dec. 28, 2011. "I know police put out alerts to the pawn shops right away (concerning Friday's break-in)," Brees-Saunders said. "But we've never recovered anything."

A suspect broke in at least once without stealing anything, she said. Other break-ins saw things like cash, cell-phones and computers go missing. Another time, a thief made away with \$1,500 in maintenance equipment, including a chainsaw, two weed-eaters and a number of hand tools.

"That was heartbreaking. And expensive," she said.

Brees-Saunders said she was glad to see that an investment of about \$1,000 in security

cameras paid off, and she's hoping someone in the community can help identify the perpetrator. To view the full security camera footage, visit [hawaii.tribune-herald.com](http://hawaii.tribune-herald.com).

"Everyone's upset," she said. "You feel violated. You feel like you're doing your best and putting your best foot forward to give our youth a chance in the community. ... You feel like we're a place we'd like the community

to support and embrace what we're trying to do, and to have things like that happen really feels like a negative push-back."

## UNEMPLOYMENT: Government jobs led statewide growth

will begin this fall — and the Kona Judiciary Complex, a \$90 million undertaking set to break ground in the fall of 2016. Additionally, ground is scheduled to be broken on a \$56 million firefighter training facility at the airport next May.

The seasonally adjusted statewide average unemployment rate was 4.1 percent in April, where it has remained for the last three months. Unemployment in Hawaii has declined fairly steadily from 4.8 percent in April of 2013, in keeping with the national trends. The national unemployment rate stood at 5.4 percent in April, down from 6.2 percent in the same month last year.

Government jobs led statewide growth areas with 1,100 openings in April, 200 of them on the Big Island. Most of the jobs were seasonal increases at the Department of Education

and the University of Hawaii system. Educational and health services added 100 jobs statewide, but losses were posted in construction, which shed 900 jobs, and trade, transportation and utilities; professional and business services; and leisure and hospitality, with those three sectors losing 200 jobs each.

Nearly 20,000 new jobs could be created statewide for the period covering the first quarter of 2014 to the same time in 2016 — an increase of 2.9 percent, according to DLIR short term employment forecasts.

Statewide, construction and extraction jobs are expected to grow 6.1 percent, with 1,540 new jobs created each year in 2014 through the first quarter of next year. Service jobs — including restaurant work, groundskeeping and maintenance — are projected to see the greatest increase, with 8,810 new jobs each year.

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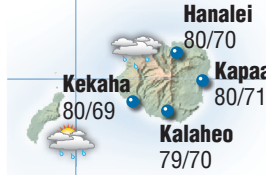

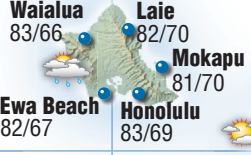

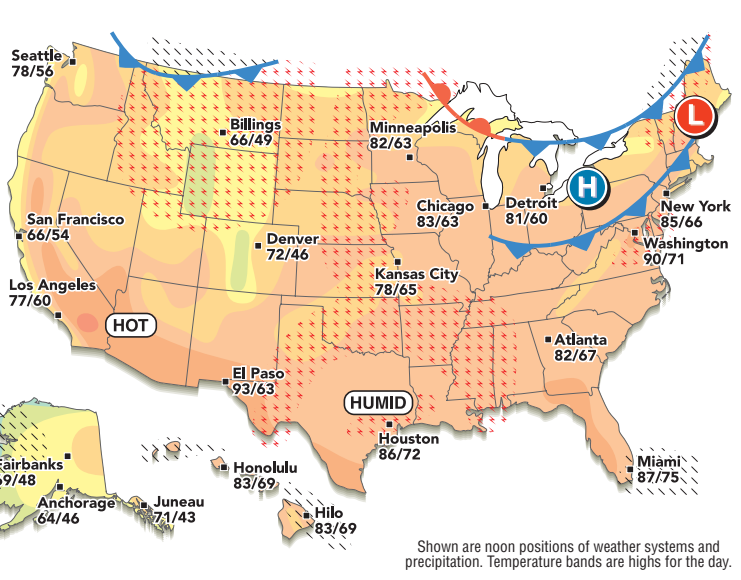

Homeowners clean up in Texas; death toll climbs to 19

HOUSTON — Homeowners dragged soggy carpet to the curb and mopped up coffee-colored muck Wednesday after a barrage of storms and floods in Texas and Oklahoma left at least 19 people dead and a dozen others missing.

More rain fell on the hard-hit Houston area, temporarily complicating the cleanup a day after a downpour of nearly a foot triggered the worst flooding the nation's fourth-largest city has seen in years. Hundreds of homes were damaged.

continued in other parts of Texas, with hundreds of people west of Fort Worth told to evacuate along the rising Brazos River and flash flood warnings posted in many areas.

Gadi Shaulsky spent the day cutting wet carpet and padding from his home

in Houston's Meyerland section and taking it to the curb. His neighbors were doing the same. A water mark showed that up to 6 inches of water had seeped into the home.

"That was just really frightening. It was just flowing in," said Shaulsky's wife, Jodi. With tears in her eyes, she added: "It's hard to wrap your head around all that needs to be done."

Houston Mayor Annise Parker said two people whose boat capsized during a rescue were missing. Another person was missing in suburban Houston. And in central Texas, crews resumed the search for nine people feared dead

after the swollen Blanco River smashed through Wimberley, a small tourist town between San Antonio and Austin, over the Memorial Day weekend.

This has been the wettest month on record for Texas, and there are still several days left. The state climatologist's office said Wednesday that Texas has gotten an average of 7.54 inches of rain in May, breaking the old record of 6.66 inches, set in June 2004.

Texas has been hit with almost continuous storms for the past week to 10 days. The wettest area has been from Dallas-Fort Worth to the Red River, where some places have

gotten more than 20 inches of rain.

The flooding in Houston affected virtually every part of the city. At least 2,500 vehicles were abandoned by drivers, and anywhere from 800 to 1,400 homes were damaged, officials said.

The death toll climbed to 19 — 15 in Texas, four in Oklahoma. Houston alone had six storm-related deaths.

The deaths in Texas included a man whose body was pulled from the Blanco; a 14-year-old who was found with his dog in a storm drain; and a high school senior who died Saturday after her car was caught in high water.

The commission went into a closed-door meeting Wednesday to evaluate executive director Les Kondo.

The evaluation talk was held after House Speaker Joseph Souki sent a four-page letter to the commission complaining about its "recent attempts

to prohibit common and regular practices," including receiving gifts, meals and charitable fundraiser tickets of a certain value. His letter was prompted by a recommendation by the commission that lawmakers should reject a gift basket, he said.

Teachers also have been upset about a commission recommendation that educators who organize and chaperone educational trips shouldn't get a free ride from tour companies.

"It's not my job to make legislators and employees happy," Kondo told the commission Wednesday

before the five-member panel went into session. "It's not my job to tell people what they want to hear or let them do what they want to do. It's my job to do what's right, not what's popular."

Kondo defended his interpretation about what gifts lawmakers should not accept, saying that just because lawmakers were accepting lavish meals or using state funds to buy themselves birthday cakes in the past doesn't mean it was right. The ethics commission's staff of 10 oversees more than 60,000 state employees

and government officials, which can be a lonely job, Kondo said.

"We are now investigating and enforcing more violations. ... There are growing pains, for sure, but we're in this together," Kondo said.

Several government officials, including Bruce Coppa, who was chief of staff to former Gov. Neil Abercrombie; and former Lt. Gov. Duke Aiona spoke in support of Kondo during the meeting, while other officials mailed in letters praising his work.

"He's not afraid to fight the fight that needs to

be fought," said Kristin Izumi-Nitao, executive director of the Hawaii Campaign Spending Commission.

Hawaii schools Superintendent Kathryn Matayoshi said in a letter that a school staff member felt like Kondo was interrogating her while discussing whether teachers should be allowed to go on a planned trip. In that instance, although the commission didn't approve of the trip, it allowed it to go forward because it was happening in a matter of weeks.

In the public meeting,

commissioners spent 40 minutes discussing how to handle whether teachers should be allowed to go on previously planned trips for which they are reimbursed but reached no conclusion, despite the fact that there are three upcoming school trips in June.

"I think everyone is concerned about the parents and the students," said Commissioner Melanie Wood. "That's not what we have to deal with. The Ethics Commission has to deal with practice and people's compliance with the ethics law."

### Alleged Honaunau shooter pleads no contest to manslaughter

A South Kona man will spend a year behind bars in connection with the 2014 shooting death of a 52-year-old Honaunau resident.

Monte Moreau was sentenced on May 14 by 3rd Circuit Court Judge Ronald Ibarra to 24 months of incarceration with all but one year suspended in connection with the July 2014 shooting death of Todd Shaver. He must also perform 200 hours of community service and pay restitution of \$163,661.59 to the state Department of Human Services and \$1,609.56 to Janet Shaver, according to court records.

Moreau was charged with second-degree murder in connection with the shooting death of Shaver on July 3, 2014, following an incident at a Honaunau house where both of them lived, but in separate apartments. Shaver was shot in the abdomen and died July 26, 2014.

In March, Moreau pleaded no contest to a lesser charge of manslaughter.

### Kilauea Volcano's summit showing signs of inflation

Kilauea Volcano's summit is showing signs of inflation, the U.S. Geological Survey Hawaiian Volcano Observatory reports.

The observatory said its tiltmeters, which are used to measure tiny changes in the slope angle or "tilt" of the ground, at the summit began recording minor inflationary tilt early Wednesday. The change to inflation followed several days of deflation that commenced Sunday evening.

During inflation, magma rises into the summit reservoir, according to the observatory. The summit reservoir enters the deflation portion of the cycle when the magma moves laterally into a rift zone, and either erupts or is stored there.

Scientists added that seismicity rates beneath Kilauea's summit, upper East Rift Zone and Southwest Rift Zone have been at normal, background levels for the past several days.

The tiltmeter on the north flank of Puu Oo continues to show no significant change in tilt as of Wednesday morning.

Breakouts along the June 27 lava flow remained active within about 5.3 miles of Puu Oo, scientists said.

The U.S. Geological Survey Hawaiian Volcano Observatory on March 25 downgraded its alert level for Kilauea Volcano from a "warning" to a "watch."

### Moped-dump truck accident victim dies from injuries

A moped passenger injured in a crash with a dump truck Tuesday has died from her injuries.

The Hawaii Police Department reports Mokihana Choy, 29, of Kailua-Kona was pronounced dead at The Queen's Medical Center on Oahu at 12:24 p.m. Wednesday.

The operator of the moped, a 21-year-old Kailua-Kona man, remains at Kona Community Hospital in stable condition.

Police have reclassified the case from a negligent injury to a negligent homicide. The

investigation continues.

At approximately 10 a.m. Tuesday, the moped was merging onto the southbound lane of QueenKaahumanu Highway from Hualalai Road, when it attempted to merge between a dump truck and the trailer it was pulling. The trailer ran over the moped, which was carrying the operator and Choy, police said. Neither rider was wearing a helmet.

The operator of the dump truck was not injured.

This is the 10th fatality this year compared with seven at this time last year.

### US military gets new commander for Asia-Pacific region

PEARL HARBOR — A new commander has taken over as the top U.S. military officer in the Asia-Pacific region.

Adm. Harry Harris assumed command of the U.S. Pacific Command during a ceremony at Pearl Harbor on Wednesday. He replaces Adm. Samuel Locklear, who has retired.

Harris moves over from the U.S. Pacific Fleet, which he led since October 2013. The Naval Academy graduate long served as a naval flight officer on board reconnaissance and patrol aircraft.

More than 300,000 troops are assigned to the Pacific Command's area, which stretches from the U.S. west coast to the western border of India.

The command encompasses 200 Pacific Fleet ships and 300 aircraft assigned to Pacific Air Forces. Also included are two Marine Expeditionary Force units and 60,000 Army personnel.

### Supreme Court dismisses gay marriage challenge

HONOLULU — The state Supreme Court is dismissing a lawsuit challenging Hawaii's gay marriage law.

The court said in an opinion Wednesday that the plaintiffs lack standing to make the challenge.

Republican state Rep. Bob McDermott is one of four people who sued to stop the state from issuing marriage licenses to same-sex couples. The circuit court denied their motion for a temporary restraining order. They appealed.

Deputy Attorney General Deirdre Marie-Iha argued before the high court in December, saying the plaintiffs have no standing. She argued no one is harmed by giving rights to more people.

McDermott said the state Supreme Court took the "cowardly" way out by throwing out the case based on the plaintiffs' standing. He said he doesn't know what his next step will be.

### Hawaii ranks fourth in senior health report

HONOLULU — According to

a new report, Hawaii fell two spots from last year and placed fourth in the nation for the health of its senior citizens.

The Honolulu Star-Advertiser reported this year's America's Health Rankings Senior Report was released Tuesday. The rankings were issued by United Health Foundation based on 35 measures of well-being.

According to the report, Hawaii placed first in low prevalence of obesity, ample supply of geriatricians, low rate of premature death, among other categories.

The report also noted that Hawaii seniors are more physically active than the rest of the nation.

Hawaii did report having more underweight elderly. Also, more elderly report joint pain in Hawaii than in other states.

The report found Vermont was the healthiest state for seniors, and Louisiana was the least healthy.

### No sex assault charges for women in massage parlor sting

HONOLULU — Honolulu's top prosecutor is dismissing sex assault charges against 16 women who were arrested in a massage parlor prostitution sting.

Prosecuting Attorney Keith Kaneshiro said Wednesday the allegations might have constituted a technical legal violation, but there wasn't proof beyond a reasonable doubt.

The women were arrested earlier this month, but instead of arresting them on prostitution charges, police accused them of sex assault.

Legal experts say that's an unusual tactic.

A Honolulu police spokeswoman provided a statement saying officers are uncomfortable enforcing prostitution laws but have a job to do.

Hawaii has a strange history with prostitution investigations. Until a year ago, it was legal for police officers to have sex with prostitutes as part of investigations. State lawmakers changed that last year after The Associated Press highlighted the loophole.

### Tours on USS Arizona Memorial suspended after ship hits dock

HONOLULU — Tours on the USS Arizona Memorial have been suspended indefinitely after a vessel struck and damaged the structure's dock Wednesday, the National Park Service said.

Instead, boats were taking visitors to a spot in Pearl Harbor near the memorial where they can view it from a distance, said spokeswoman Abby Wines.

"At this point it's not safe for visitors or anyone to land there and disembark at the memorial," Wines said.

The crash occurred when the hospital ship USNS Mercy and a civilian tugboat contracted by the Navy were maneuvering in the harbor. Either the tugboat or the Mercy hit the dock, Wines said. The Navy and the Park Service said in a statement the incident was being investigated.

A ramp and handrails connecting the dock to the memorial were mangled, Wines said. Park Service and Navy divers were assessing the damage from underwater Wednesday.

It was unclear how long tours on the memorial will be suspended, Wines said. The underwater assessments will provide a better idea, but the current situation is expected to continue for at least a few days.

The Pearl Harbor Visitors Center, which has a museum and gift shop, is still open.

OAKLAND, Calif. — After a generation of wishing and waiting, the Golden State Warriors have finally arrived on basketball's biggest stage again.

Stephen Curry had 26 points and eight rebounds, Harrison Barnes added 24 points and the Warriors advanced to the NBA Finals for the first time in 40 years with a 104-90 victory

over the Houston Rockets on Wednesday night.

The charterboat Luna weighed a 1,226.5-pound Pacific blue marlin on Wednesday — Kona's second "grander" of 2015.

The big billfish hit a "Smash Bait" lure made by local lure-maker Erik Rusnak, and fought for two hours before angler Dean Lemman could get it to skipper Chip Van Mols and crew Shawn Bebeau.

It's the fourth grander for Van Mols, and his largest.

The fish is Hawaii's third grander of the year. It comes just one day after the boat No Problem caught a 1,058-pound blue on Maui and three months after the Kona boat Ihu Nui boated a 1,058-pound blue.

As of West Hawaii Today's deadline, Hawaii's big trio are the only blue marlin granders caught anywhere in the world so far this year. The Maui grander hit a purple Softhead (TM) fished off Menele Bay, Lanai. The Ihu Nui fish took a Koya Poi Dog lure.

## Hilo native Kolten Wong second in NL All-Star voting

Big Islanders have work to do if they want to see one of their own start in the Major League Baseball All-Star Game.

The St. Louis Cardinals' Kolten Wong was second among second basemen in National League balloting released Wednesday, but the 2008 Kamehameha graduate trailed the front-runner, the Miami Marlins' Dee Gordon, by more than 350,000 votes.

In his first at-bat after the first wave of voting was

made public, Wong cracked his sixth home run of the season against Arizona. He began the day hitting .320, eighth-best in the NL.

The Cardinals have gained plenty of support — outfielder Matt Holiday, catcher Yadier Molina, third baseman Matt Carpenter and shortstop Jhonny Peralta were all among the leaders — but fans also recognized Gordon for his torrid start. He began the day hitting a NL-leading .368 and his 18 stolen bases were tops in the majors.

Gordon garnered 934,249 votes, Wong had 582,238 and the Dodgers' Howie Kendrick was far back in third at 385,427.

This is the first year that voting, which started in late April, is being conducted exclusively online at MLB.com or any team site, through July 2. According to an MLB release, fans can submit up to 35 ballots, which they also can receive by texting VOTE to 89269.

The 86th All-Star Game will be held July 14 at Great American Ball Park in

Cincinnati. Of course, even if Wong doesn't catch up in the voting, he could still make the trip as a reserve.

After the fans pick the eight NL starters, pitchers and reserves will be selected by a combination of player picks and choices made by San Francisco manager Bruce Bochy, who guided the Giants a World Series victory last season. The 34th and final roster spot, will be determined by a fan vote from a list of five players.

## Federer, Wawrinka reach third round at French; Halep ousted

PARIS — Roger Federer dispatched Spain's Marcel Granollers 6-2, 7-6 (7-1), 6-3 on Wednesday to win his 63rd match at the French Open and stay on pace with Rafael Nadal in the Roland Garros victory chase.

There was a major upset on the women's side as No. 3 seed and 2014 finalist Simona Halep was beaten 7-5, 6-1 by Mirjana Lucic-Baroni.

The 33-year-old Croatian, who sat out six years of her career during the previous decade, last won a Paris match in 2002.

While sixth-seeded Nadal has dominated with nine titles from his past 10 appearances, it was Federer who won the clay grand slam trophy in 2009, the only year that Nadal lost a match.

The Spaniard reached the second round this week with his 67th win, with Federer just behind in the count. Any slip by Nadal at this edition and he could find himself trailing Federer in total Paris match wins.

Federer, the second seed, won his fourth match over Granollers as they met for the first time on clay.

"It was a very tough match, I had to work hard," said Federer, a 17-time grand slam champion. "He plays a really varied game and can do a lot with it."

"I'm very satisfied with this win, it's good to get it in three sets also."

"Things went well for me for the first couple of sets, I think I was in control. Even though I was down a break in the second, I still felt the match was in my racquet. When you feel that way, obviously you're always going to feel more confident, more comfortable."

Stan Wawrinka, seeded eighth, joined in with a victory as he defeated Dusan Lajovic 6-3, 6-4, 5-7, 6-3 with 11 aces, 53 winners and breaks on eight of 20 chances.

"It was a good win for me," Wawrinka said. "In general I started well, played well. I had some trouble with my serve, but that's it. I'm happy to get through one more match."

Wawrinka will next face surprise American Steve Johnson, who put out Sergiy Stakhovskiy 2-6, 6-3, 7-6 (7-5), 7-6 (8-6), while Federer takes on unknown quantity Damir Dzumhur of Bosnia-Herzegovina, who beat former Australian Open finalist Marcos Baghdatis 6-4, 6-3, 4-6, 6-2.

Fourth-seeded Tomas Berdych won a Czech battle with Radek Stepanek 6-3, 6-7 (7-9), 6-3, 6-3.

## A-Rod passes Gehrig for all-time AL RBI lead as Yankees sweep Royals

NEW YORK — The Teflon Titan has surpassed the Iron Horse, and the Yankees have a sweep of the reigning American League champions to show for it.

Alex Rodriguez teed off on Chris Young's 0-1 slider for a three-run homer in the third inning of the Yankees' 4-2 win over the Kansas City Royals, earning his 1,995th career RBI and surpassing Lou Gehrig as the all-time AL leader. He is only one short of Barry Bonds, but far behind Hank Aaron, who holds the Major League record at 2,297. It was the 665th homer of Rodriguez's career and, after Wednesday afternoon's two-hit performance, he is 19 short of 3,000.

"I haven't played a lot of baseball in the last two years, but I feel like I'm in a good place. I'm happy. I'm having fun," said the 39-year-old Rodriguez, who sat out last season while serving a drug suspension.

Though there are conflicting numbers for RBI totals (it did not become an official stat until

1920), MLB rankings are determined by the Elias Sports Bureau, and the AL crown is undoubtedly another chapter in the A-Rod redemption odyssey.

The ball, which traveled 352 feet to right, actually was the shortest homer of the year for Rodriguez, who has 11. Only Mark Teixeira has more home runs on the Yankees, with 14. A-Rod's 26 RBIs this season also are second on the team.

Rodriguez's contributions, which broke a tie at 1, mitigated some of the uncertainty surrounding Michael Pineda's shaky beginning. Pineda, who in his last two starts took the loss and allowed a combined 12 runs (nine earned), seemed primed for more of the same in the first inning before settling down considerably for the remainder.

Pineda allowed a hard-hit ball to Alcides Escobar to lead off the game (it was gloved on the backhand by Chase Headley) and then allowed a home run to Mike Moustakas on a 1-2 slider that ended up deposited deep in the bleachers in right-center. Headley made another nice play on an Eric

Hosmer shot — this time a diving stop -- to end the inning and limit the damage.

The Yankees answered back in the top of the second on Brian McCann's leadoff homer to right — his second in three games. Pineda then retired the side in order in the second and allowed only a single to Escobar in the top of the third before A-Rod provided some historic breathing room. Brett Gardner led off the bottom of the third with a double to right and Headley walked to set up the home run.

Pineda (6-2, 3.36 ERA) pitched 62/3 innings, allowing six hits and an earned run with a walk and eight strikeouts. The Royals threatened considerably in the fifth when they put runners in scoring position with one out, but Pineda struck out Moustakas swinging on a 1-2 cutter and set down Lorenzo Cain on three pitches to end the threat.

The Royals tacked on a run in the eighth when Didi Gregorius sailed a throw to first base into foul territory on an infield hit from Kendrys Morales, allowing Lorenzo Cain to score from second.

Enriques was named the BIIF Division I Player of the Year, in a vote by the league's coaches, cementing his family as the most accomplished in league history.

Sophomore brothers and twins Addie and Avery Enriques weren't recognized, but shared setting and ball-handling duties for the Warriors, who often beat bigger teams because of their better ball-control.

Evan Enriques, a 2014 Kamehameha graduate, was a three-time BIIF Player of the Year. He was an immediate weapon, and on the All-BIIF first team as a freshman.

"We're very competitive, especially playing with each other. It just makes us better," Emmett said. "We're all also trying to stay out of the shadows of each other, and be known as individuals rather than a younger brother."

Last season, Emmett Enriques was an honorable mention. Joining him on the first team is Kamehameha senior middle blocker Paki Iaea.

Everyone on the first team is a newcomer, except for Hilo senior setter Maikah Tandal, the only repeat selection.

Rounding out the first team are Hilo middles Sione Atuekaho and Justice Lord, hitter Bradley Comilla, and libero Trevor Castro, Kealakehe middle Peni Kalavi and opposite Seth Lincoln, and Waiakea hitter Ty Nishimura.

For comparison's sake, Evan and Emmett Enriques are roughly the same size at 6 feet 1, and share the same core strength their dad has spent a lifetime teaching: ball-handling.

Addie and Avery are outside hitters and setters on their dad and Kamehameha coach Guy Enriques' Southside 16s club team, and have won a USA Volleyball Junior National championship.

But from club ball to USA Volleyball High Performance (the pipeline to the national team), the focus for all four brothers has always been ball-control, especially passing in serve-serve and defending attacks.

That's a reason Evan and Emmett, who signed with Cal Baptist, have scholarships as liberos and will turn into rivals in the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation, the most competitive conference.

But Evan and Emmett are vastly different as far as personalities, channeling their intensity in contrasting fashions.

Evan's fire has always been internal, much like an ace pitcher who retains an unflappable composure whether he's firing a no-hitter or getting shelled.

Emmett's furnace is apparent for all to see, much like a linebacker who goes full blast on every play. Back to the diamond, he'll throw fastballs all day, even though he's got a pretty good roll shot as a

changeup.

"Their desire to win is similar, but how they go about it is different," Guy Enriques said. "Evan thinks about the game, and spends a lot of time on the mental part. Evan doesn't allow himself to get too high."

"Emmett takes advantage of that high and rides it. It's a dangerous path to take sometimes. But when he rides it, then it can be really nice."

The Kamehameha coach pointed out that Emmett had the toughest deal because he played under his brother's shadow for three long years, and had to exercise a ton of patience, and wait for his turn to shine.

But the coach and his wife Julie Enriques always knew that all the mini-battles in the household and on the volleyball court didn't drive the brothers, especially Evan and Emmett, apart, but rather brought them closer.

"Emmett was asked who his inspiration was and he pointed to Evan," Guy Enriques said. "We were not shocked, but that made our family proud. He was always fighting under a shadow, but still looking up to Evan. When he said that, it really melted his mom's heart."

"We were a different team last year because we went to one guy. The team supported that because Evan was so team-oriented. Emmett had his own identity, but we had another guy step up. Isaiah Laeha was big against Moanalua (at states). It was nice to see a different guy step up."

### NEW-LOOK WARRIORS

Kamehameha will be much different next season because Emmett Enriques was such an all-around presence, not only as a dependable lighting bolt attacker, but also a tough blocker and premium back-row ball-handler.

The competitive spirit will continue because Addie and Avery will soon be the same size as their older brothers, and feature a similar skill-set.

"Evan didn't have to face this struggle. With his path, he led and never had to look behind," Guy Enriques said. "Emmett had to look ahead and behind with his two younger brothers. Emmett had to fight two different battles, one on top and two from behind."

"The two younger ones want to get out and swing. But they had to play the role of setter. We needed their setting and ball-handling. Like Emmett, they had to wait. The battle between Emmett and Evan was tough, but between the twins it'll be tougher."

# US, Swiss target top soccer officials in corruption probe

ZURICH — The U.S. government launched an attack on what it called deep-seated and brazen corruption in soccer's global governing body Wednesday, pulling FIFA executives out of a luxury Swiss hotel to face racketeering charges and raiding regional offices in Miami.

Swiss officials also invaded FIFA headquarters, seizing records and computers to investigate whether the decisions to award World Cups to Russia and Qatar were rigged.

Scandals and rumors of corruption have dogged FIFA throughout the 17-year reign of its president, Sepp Blatter, but he was not named in either investigation. He is scheduled to stand Friday for re-election to a fifth, four-year term, and the organization said the vote will go ahead as planned, despite the turmoil.

FIFA also ruled out a revote of the World Cup bids won by Russia in 2018 and Qatar in 2022.

"We welcome the actions and the investigations by the U.S. and Swiss authorities and believe that it will help to reinforce measures that FIFA has already taken to root out any wrongdoing in football," Blatter said in a statement. The organization said it was cooperating fully with the investigation, and one American prosecutor said the charges were only the beginning.

Some of the biggest names in soccer said they had complained for years about corruption in FIFA, which oversees the world's most popular sport and generates billions in revenue each year.

"I was treated like a crazy person," former soccer great Diego Maradona told radio station Radio La Red in Buenos Aires. "Now the FBI has told the truth."

Former Brazilian star Romario, an outspoken FIFA critic, said "someone had to eventually arrest them one day."

Authorities conducted early-morning raids in Zurich at FIFA headquarters and the five-star Baur

au Lac Hotel. In Miami, FBI and IRS agents carried computers and boxes out of the headquarters of CONCACAF, the governing body of North and Central America and the Caribbean, whose past and current presidents were among 14 defendants named in a 47-count indictment filled with corruption charges that include wire fraud, money laundering and racketeering conspiracy.

Swiss police arrested seven soccer officials at the request of American prosecutors and threatened them with extradition to the U.S. Four other soccer and marketing officials and two corporate entities agreed to plead guilty, and prosecutors said they agreed to forfeit more than \$150 million in illegal profits.

"Beginning in 1991, two generations of soccer officials ... used their positions of trust within their respective organizations to solicit bribes from sports marketers in exchange for the commercial rights to their soccer tournaments," U.S. Attorney General Loretta E. Lynch said in New York. "They did this over and over, year after year, tournament after

tournament."

Richard Weber, head of the IRS Criminal Division, called the case "the World Cup of fraud."

Kelly T. Currie, acting U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of New York, said the 161-page indictment detailed decades of "brazen corruption" and said prosecutors will probe the role of banks involved.

"The ultimate victim is soccer at large: it's the fans, it's the organization," Currie said. "The reason that these people were able to make so much money corruptly is just the love people have for the sport."

Two current FIFA vice presidents were among those arrested and indicted, Jeffrey Webb of the Cayman Islands and Eugenio Figueredo of Uruguay. The others are Eduardo Li of Costa Rica, Julio Rocha of Nicaragua, Costas Takkas of Britain, Rafael Esquivel of Venezuela and Jose Maria Marin of Brazil.

All seven are connected with CONCACAF and CONMEBOL, South America's governing body, and face up to 20 years in prison if convicted.

FIFA suspended 11 people, including Webb and

Figueredo, from all soccer-related activities.

Webb called himself a reformer when he was elected as CONCACAF president in 2012. Prosecutors alleged part of the bribe money directed to Webb was transferred to the account of a contractor building a swimming pool at Webb's home in Loganville, Georgia.

The Swiss justice ministry said six of the seven officials arrested oppose extradition to the United States. American authorities have 40 days to submit the formal extradition request.

Four of the men indicted are sports marketing executives and another works in broadcasting. Jack Warner, a former FIFA vice president from Trinidad and Tobago, was among those indicted, and he turned himself in to police in Port-of-Spain after they issued an arrest warrant at the request of U.S. authorities.

The Justice Department cited bribes and kickbacks involving media rights deals involving World Cup qualifying matches in the Caribbean and Central America; the Copa America, South America's continental national team

championship; the Copa Libertadores, the continent's club championship; plus the CONCACAF Gold Cup and Champions League.

Prosecutors said that when CONMEBOL reached agreements on Copa America deals worth \$352.5 million with a new company named Datisa, that company agreed to pay \$110 million in bribes to South American soccer officials.

A dozen schemes were detailed in the indictment, including \$10 million in payments from a FIFA account that ultimately benefited Warner following his 2004 vote for South Africa to host the 2010 World Cup. With the backing of Nelson Mandela, South Africa beat rival bids from Morocco and Egypt to host that tournament.

The Swiss prosecutors' office said the U.S. probe was separate from its investigation but that authorities were working together.

The votes to award the World Cups to Russia and Qatar have been surrounded in controversy and accusations of corruption.

The Swiss prosecutors' office said it seized

"electronic data and documents" at FIFA's headquarters as part of the probe. Swiss police said they will question 10 FIFA executive committee members who took part in the World Cup votes in December 2010.

Qatar, a tiny Gulf nation with little soccer tradition, was criticized as a host because of its extreme summer heat. FIFA has since been forced to move the tournament to November-December instead of the usual June-July slot.

FIFA hired former U.S. attorney Michael Garcia to investigate the 2018 and 2022 bid process. His findings were never fully released and both Russia and Qatar were confirmed as hosts. Garcia's full report was not released but was turned over to Swiss authorities in November.

Russian Sports Minister Vitaly Mutko, also a FIFA executive committee member, told The Associated Press: "We've got nothing to hide. We're prepared to show everything. We've always acted within the law."

Qatari soccer officials declined comment.

Hundreds of soccer officials are in Switzerland for the FIFA congress, where Blatter is widely expected to win re-election.

European soccer's governing body said the election should be postponed and that it would consider boycotting the FIFA congress following the arrests. UEFA general secretary Gianni Infantino said the corruption investigations "tarnish the image of football as a whole." In a sign of the loyalty that Blatter enjoys, however, the Asian Football Confederation opposed a delay and repeated its support for the 79-year-old president.

Blatter's only opponent in Friday's election, Prince Ali bin al-Hussein of Jordan, seized on the situation to push his candidacy.

slow start and sweatied out a shaky finish in Game 5 to close out the Rockets and set up a matchup with LeBron

James and the Cleveland Cavaliers beginning June 4.

It was hardly the prettiest performance — but one they'll savor nonetheless.

Yellow streams and confetti fell from the rafters when the final buzzer sounded. The Warriors shared hugs and handshakes, and the crowd chanted "M-V-P!" for Curry.

He relished the moment on the court with his 2-year-old daughter, Riley, who joined him in his post-game news conference — laughing, playfully interrupting him and walking around the room again.

"I think she's taking advantage of the moment for sure," Curry quipped.

Dwight Howard led Houston with 18 points and 16 rebounds. But MVP runner-up James Harden had a forgettable finale, with a play-off-record 13 turnovers and 14 points on 2-of-11 shooting.

"Tried to do a little bit too much and turned the ball over and gave them easy baskets in transition," Harden said. "This isn't where we wanted to end at. It's a really good season for us. Next year we want to be better, and we will."

It was a tough way for the Rockets' run to end.

They overcame a knee injury that sidelined Howard half the season to finish second in the West, played without starters Patrick Beverley and Donatas Motiejunas in the playoffs and rallied from a 3-1 deficit to beat the Los Angeles Clippers in the second round.

The Warriors were one obstacle Houston couldn't clear.

"The guys fought hard," Rockets coach Kevin McHale said. "One thing about the team is that they were battlers, and a lot of guys in that room you feel pretty comfortable going to war with."

Curry said he had no lingering effects from his frightening fall in Game 4 that left him with a bruised head and right side. The MVP wore a protective yellow sleeve on his right arm, which he shed in the third quarter after shooting 4 for 12 and the Warriors clinging to a 52-46 half-time lead.

Things got tougher on Curry and the Warriors when backcourt mate Thompson faked a shot that drew Trevor Ariza in the air early in the fourth

quarter. Thompson absorbed Ariza's knee to the side of his head, sending him to the floor.

Thompson, who finished with 20 points, lay on the ground for a minute before walking to the locker room. He came back to the bench after receiving stitches on his right ear.

The Warriors said he could've returned, but they never needed him. They started the fourth on a 13-4 run and held off Houston's last-ditch efforts on free throws.

Barnes highlighted the decisive spurt with a dunk that gave Golden State an 87-72 lead with 7:10 remaining. He flexed his muscles to the sellout crowd of 19,596, which spent the final quarter on its feet in anticipation of a celebration a generation in the works.

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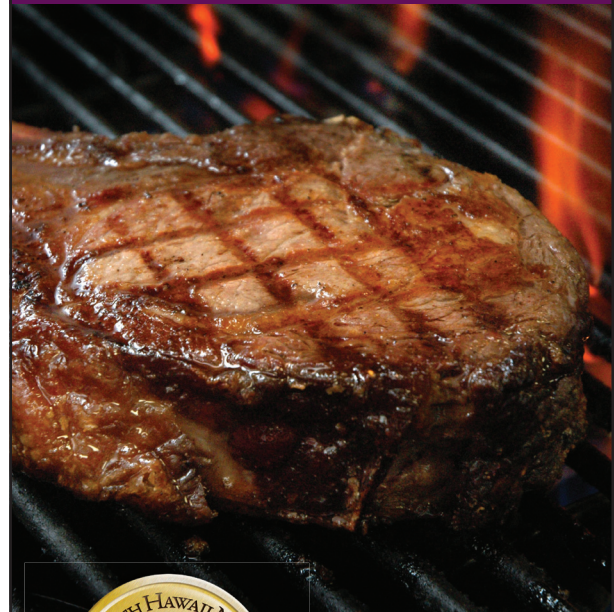
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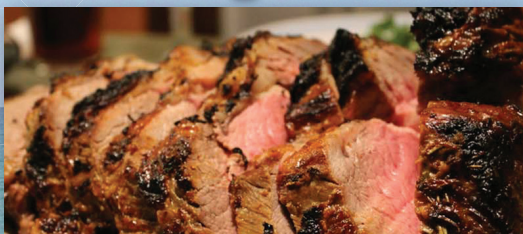
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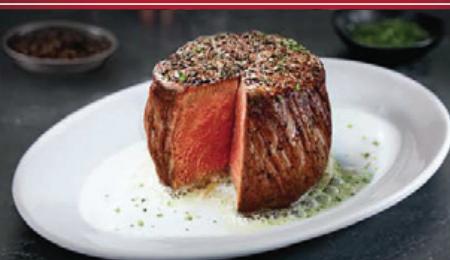
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# Beach off Cambodia's southern coast a great place to unwind

KOH RONG, Cambodia — I was in need of a digital detox (aren't we all nowadays?), but instead of heading to a swanky resort that simply locked my phone away for the duration of the stay, I headed to an undeveloped island off the southern coast of Cambodia.

Koh Rong island has lush jungle and unspoiled white-sand beaches — but no roads. It takes about an hour to get there by high-speed ferry from Cambodia's southern beach town of Sihanoukville.

Once docked, I bypassed the throng of backpacker-friendly hostels known for cheap dining and wild parties to celebrate full moons, and headed to a secluded resort called Pura Vita. Hotel staff welcomed me at the dock, where I joined an older French couple in hopping in a rickety fishing boat to make the 15-minute journey to Sonaya Beach.

While the term resort might suggest luxury, this one, while restorative, was pretty simple. Made up of about 20 bungalows, it was so remote that electricity

was only available by generator for four hours each night. And forget about logging on to Facebook, Instagram or Twitter. Internet access was virtually non-existent in this off-the-beaten-path locale.

Instead, I spent my days lazily eating breakfast at the onsite restaurant before walking the few feet to the pristine white-sand beach and crystal-clear water. I'd dip in and out of the water and stroll along the stretch of land before taking a late afternoon nap or spend hours reading a book as the waves splashed before me.

Diving and snorkeling as well as jungle trekking

is available for visitors looking for an adrenaline rush.

A full moon party one night along the rows of hostels near the island's pier interrupted my quiet retreat — even from miles away — but otherwise the resort offered the tranquility that I needed.

It's "Thailand 30 years ago," Pura Vita owner Vanny Ea said of her isolated oasis. The resort has slowly grown over the years from just one bungalow and restaurant, but Ea said she wants to make sure both the resort and the island remains a calm and serene experience for her guests.

But word is getting out. Local media reported in February that American reality show "Survivor" is filming future seasons on the island.

### If You Go...

KOH RONG, Cambodia: About one hour via high-speed ferry from Sihanoukville. Sihanoukville is about a five-hour bus ride or three-hour taxi ride from Cambodia's capital of Phnom Penh. Pura Vita is an isolated resort located on Koh Rong's southeast coast. Pura Vita resort: puravitaresort.com. Bungalows run approximately \$65 to \$75 per night and include breakfast.

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# Brothers disagree on medical care decisions

**Dear Annie:** My father was in prison for my entire childhood. I am now 23 and have managed to build a good relationship with him since he was released two years ago.

Recently, Dad became very ill and stopped breathing. He was on life support for a week. Because I am his closest relative, I am in charge of his health care. I was told the damage was too severe and he would never recover. They expect him to die within weeks. When Dad woke up, I was given the option of making him "comfortable" with medicine that would eventually stop his breathing.

I want Dad to be happy in his last days, so I asked him what he wanted. He said he wanted to live with me, so I brought him home, and he is in hospice care. Now his brothers are furious that I didn't put him in a nursing home. They think he would get rehab there and be able to live a normal life again.

When my father was incarcerated, no one in his family made any effort to be in my life. Dad told his brothers that he is prepared to die and wants to spend his last days with his daughter and his grandchildren. Plus, a nursing home won't treat him if he refuses treatment, and it isn't likely to help him in any event. He suffered terrible brain damage when he stopped breathing.

But, Annie, his brothers are making my life terribly stressful. I have tried to explain to them that they can't make him fight this battle, and sadly, they cannot fight it for him. I feel so overwhelmed. I am thinking of forcing Dad to go to a nursing home so his brothers will know he had every chance. But if he dies there (and he probably would), I will hate myself for not letting him live his remaining days the way he wants. I don't want to regret this decision forever. What do I do? — Your

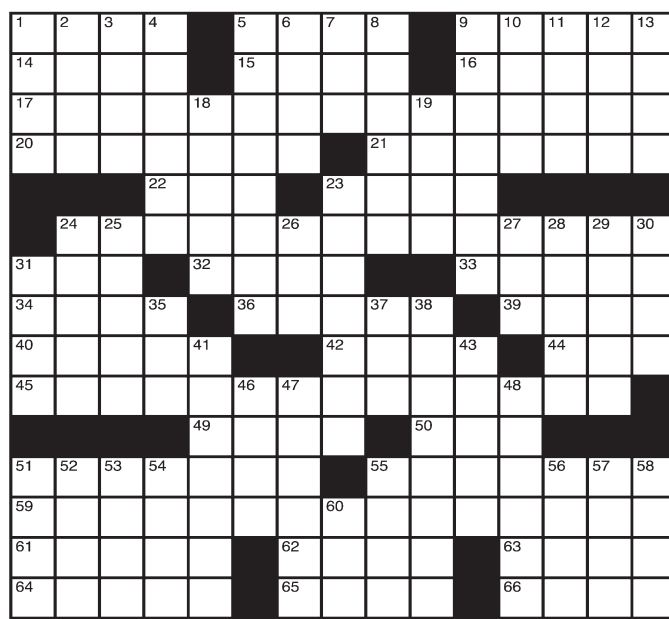

Rubber bridge players don't care much about overtricks, but at duplicate, where overtricks are hugely important, the battle over them can be good fun to watch.

West started with the unfortunate, but normal, lead of a low heart. Declarer put up dummy's jack and was off to a good start. South ran the 10 of diamonds at trick two, losing to the jack, and West stopped to think. There was room for only one honor

card in his partner's hand, and declarer's play told him that it was in diamonds. It was clear to West that declarer would re-enter dummy with the queen of clubs and repeat the diamond finesse successfully. The defense would have to settle for one diamond and one spade for a likely poor score.

West found the only card in his hand to give declarer a problem — he shifted to the jack of spades! This ran around to South's queen and it was his turn to think. He, of course, believed that the ace of spades was in the East hand, and that meant that repeating the diamond finesse was dangerous. Should it lose to West, a spade continuation would defeat him. Believing that he was already ahead one trick from the lead, he tried for an end-play on East. He cashed his hearts and his clubs, then played the ace and another diamond. His contract was safe and, should East hold the king of diamonds, at least he would have to give dummy the king of spades. Instead, he ended up with only nine tricks and a great score went to East-West.
