# Hospital to cut 34 jobs, close skilled nursing unit

By no later than Aug. 1, 34 positions at Kona Community Hospital will be eliminated, and the hospital will shut down its 18-bed skilled nursing

Administrators the 94-bed hospital in Kealakekua announced the cuts Monday morning as part of a plan to patch a \$6 million hole in the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

"It is with regret that we must make these decisions," said Jay Kreuzer, West Hawaii Regional CEO of Hawaii Health Systems Corporation.

"Over the past several years, the entire hospital staff has pulled together to help address our financial challenges. Our hospital departments are running efficiently, and there is no excess or waste to be trimmed," Kreuzer said. "Sadly, these efforts do not offset our fiscal 2016 deficit due to lack of state funding."

Kreuzer declined to identify specific positions that will be eliminated, saying employees have not yet been informed of the decision.

The plan cuts the hospital's losses by \$3 million but still leaves a \$2.5 million loss. However, only \$900,000 of that is a cash flow deficit, which the

part by increased labor costs because of collective bargaining arrangements and retiree health benefits previously covered by the

state, Kreuzer said. Prior to being faced with those costs and the fact that the state would not fund them, the hospital was on

course to break even following a streamlining last year that cut \$9 million

# Report: Tourism leading Big Island economic recovery

Tourism is once again expected the Big Island over the next few years, with hotel rooms plentiful and bargain-priced, compared to

That's according to UHERO, the University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization, which on Friday released a report showing a 2.7 percent increase in overall tourism on the Big Island, despite an 8.1 percent drop in Japanese visitors after the loss of direct flights from Japan to Kona International Airport.

Hawaii Island's tourism increase is higher than Oahu's 0.3 percent, but not as optimistic as 5.4 percent for Maui and 3.8 percent for Kauai so far this year. Tourism is expected to see additional healthy gains on the neighbor islands for the next two years, before rising occupancy and costs begin to bring down growth rates, something that has already occurred on Oahu.

"You've got capacity," Carl UHERO executive Bonham, director, said Monday. "Air flight growth will be really phenomenal

### Marso charged in alleged Kailua Village hit-and-run

A Kailua-Kona man has been charged with alcohol- and drug-related offenses following an alleged hit-and-run on Saturday in Kailua Village that injured a 13-year-old

Matthew Marso, 30, is accused of driving under the influence of intoxsecond-degree negligent injury, leaving the scene of an accident involving injuries, promoting a detrimental drug in the third degree and driving without a license and proof of insurance. His bail has been set at \$2,275. If he fails to post bail, he'll make his first court appearance today.

The Nissan SUV Marso was driving Saturday afternoon jumped a curb near the intersection of Hualalai Road and Alii Drive, striking the girl, according to police and witness accounts. The girl, who is from Plano, Texas, was treated and released

Lambus stayed behind the vehicle until he reached his shop along Alii Drive and switched the car for skateboard to continue the pursuit. He arrived on scene just as the girl was hit.

The story appeared in news outlets across the world on Monday, with some tabloids hailing Lambus as a hero.

### Obama concedes Iraq setbacks, says US lacks 'complete strategy' to train Iragis

ELMAU, Germany Acknowledging military setbacks, President Barack Obama said Monday the United States still lacks a "complete strategy" for training Iraqi forces to fight the Islamic State. He urged Iraq's government to allow more of the nation's Sunnis to join the campaign against the violent militants.

Nearly one year after American troops started returning to Iraq to assist local forces, Obama said the Islamic State remains "nimble, aggressive and opportunistic." He touted "significant progress" in areas where the U.S. has trained Iraqis to fight but said forces without U.S. assistance are often illequipped and suffer from poor morale.

IS fighters captured the key Anbar provincial capital of Ramadi last month, prompting Defense Secretary Ash Carter to lament that Iraqi troops lacked "the will to fight." Still, Obama indicated that simply increasing the number of Americans in Iraq would not resolve the country's issues. The U.S. currently has about 3,000 troops there for train-andassist missions.

### **Obama: Health** law challenge based on 'twisted interpretation'

ELMAU, Germany — With a crucial legal decision looming, President Barack Obama said Monday the Supreme Court should not even have considered the latest challenge to his signature health care law but he voiced confidence the justices "will play it taining that "the thing is working. "Frankly, it probably

shouldn't even have been taken up," he said.

The remark was a direct and provocative challenge to a court that holds the fate of one of Obama's top legislative achievements in its hands. To prevail, Obama needs the votes of Chief Justice John Roberts or Justice Anthony Kennedy, one of whom most likely voted to hear the case in the first place.

### Video of officer who drew gun on black teens at pool party raises tension in **Dallas suburb**

raised tensions Monday in this Dallas suburb, where some community activists accused him of racism while others urged calm until the facts are investigated.

Jahi Adisa Bakari, the father of another teenage girl at the party, said he would press for the officer to be fired, saying he "was out of control." But Benét Embry, a black

local radio personality who witnessed the incident, said it was "not anoth-er Ferguson" or "another Baltimore," referring to other police encounters that have left suspects dead and fueled a nationwide "Black Lives Matter"

as their birthplace on passports.

In a 6-3 ruling, the court said Congress overstepped its bounds when it approved the passport law in 2002. The case mixed a dispute between Congress and the president with the thorny politics of the volatile Middle East.

The ruling ended a 12-year-old lawsuit by a Jerusalem-born American, Menachem Zivotofsky, and his U.S.-citizen parents.

The law the court struck down Monday would have forced the State Department to alter its long-standing policy of not listing Israel as the birthplace for Jerusalem-born Americans. The policy is part of the government's refusal to recognize any nation's sovereignty over Jerusalem until Israelis and Palestinians resolve its sta-

# Nurse receives probation in drug case

A 37-year-old traveling registered nurse who fraudulently obtained prescription painkillers from Hilo Medical Center for her own personal use two years ago was sentenced Monday to probation and a brief jail sentence.

Hilo Circuit Judge Greg Nakamura on Monday sentenced Trisha Ramirez to five years probation with one year in jail.

Ramirez, of Hesperia, Calif., will have to serve only 30 days in jail provided she satisfactorily completes her probation. She pleaded no contest Friday to three counts each of third-degree promotion of a dangerous drug, drug paraphernalia and obtaining controlled substances by deception or fraud.

All offenses Ramirez pleaded to are Class C felonies that carry a possible five-year prison term.

erm. "It was an agreed-upon

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sentence," said Deputy Prosecutor Shaunda Liu, who added Ramirez was given 18 days credit for time she spent behind bars after being arrested in Illinois in March on an extradition warrant.

In return for Ramirez's no-contest pleas, prosecutors dropped two counts each of promoting a dangerous drug, drug paraphernalia and obtaining controlled substances by deception and fraud.

Ramirez was also ordered to undergo substance abuse assessment and treatment, random urinalysis with no drugs or alcohol, and no possession of pharmaceutical drugs not prescribed to her, Liu said.

Ramirez, a U.S. Army veteran and mother of two, was indicted in November by a Hilo grand jury.

According to police, the drugs Ramirez took from the local hospital included meperidine, hydromorphone, morphine and fentanyl, which are opioid or synthetic opioid painkillers,

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Ramirez

and the alleged offenses took place in March 2013.

Liu said Nakamura denied Ramirez's request for a deferred acceptance of her no contest pleas, which would have erased her record upon satisfactory completion of probation.

Ramirez has "started the process of voluntarily turning in her nursing license" in Hawaii, Liu said.

A Monday phone call to Damir Kouliev, Ramirez's attorney, was not returned by press time.

### Lava lake continues to fluctuate

Kilauea Volcano's summit lava lake was well below the floor of Halemaumau Crater Monday morning, the U.S. Geological Survey Hawaiian Volcano Observatory reported.

As of Monday morning, Kilauea Volcano's summit lava lake was about 240 feet below the current floor of Halemaumau, scientists said, adding that seismic episodic bursts associated with spattering within the Overlook vent continued.

The lava lake has fluctuated since lava overflowed the crater rim periodically between April 21 and May 10 amid a period of increased activity at the summit of Kilauea Volcano that drew thousands to Hawaii Volcanoes National Park to view.

On Friday, the lake was about 154 feet below the floor and on Thursday it was 161 feet below the floor of Halemaumau. On Tuesday it was 239 feet below the floor.

The observatory said Monday that its tiltmeters, which are used to measure tiny changes in the slope angle or "tilt" of the ground, recorded deflationary tilt over the weekend. On Monday, the tiltmeter was showing little change in deflation. The summit reservoir enters the deflation portion of the cycle when the magma moves laterally into a rift zone and either erupts or is stored there.

Seismicity rates beneath upper East Rift Zone and Southwest Rift Zone have also been at normal, background levels for the past day

The tiltmeter on the north flank of Puu Oo continued to show no significant change in tilt as of Monday morning.

Breakouts along the June 27 lava flow remained active within about 5 miles of Puu Oo, scientists said.

The U.S. Geological Survey Hawaiian Volcano Observatory on March 25 downgraded its alert level for Kilauea Volcano from a "warning" to a "watch."

# Police arrest 21 for alleged drunken driving

Hawaii Island police arrested 21 motorists for

driving under the influence of an intoxicants from June 1 through Sunday. Eleven of the drivers were involved in traffic crashes. Two were younger than 21.

So far this year, there have been 447 DUI arrests compared with 539 during the same period last year, a decrease of 17.1 percent, according to the Hawaii Police Department.

Kona, South Hilo and Puna officers arrested six drivers in each district while South Kohala officers arrested two drivers and Ka'u officers arrested one driver.

There have been 649 major accidents so far this year compared with 696 during the same period last year.

So far this year, there have been 11 traffic fatalities on Hawaii Island compared with seven during the same period last year, an increase of 57.1 percent.

To date, four fatalities were related to drugs, or a combination of drugs and alcohol.

DUI roadblocks and patrols will continue islandwide.

### Firefighters extinguish Waimea home fire

A 38-year-old woman sustained a second-degree burn to her leg in a house fire Monday in Waimea. Firefighters arrived at 59-0552 Lokelani Place at 8:38 a.m. and found two occupants standing outside the two-story home with light smoke emanating from an attached single story common area. The fire was confined to the laundry and living room areas and was extinguished. Estimated damage was \$100,000, caused by smoke and heat.

Four companies with a total of 20 personnel responded to the call. The cause of the fire is under investigation.

### Kapaia site offered for youth drug treatment center

LIHUE, Kauai — Grove Farm has agreed to donate 5 acres of land so that Kauai County can start building a youth substance abuse treatment center.

The Garden Island reported Mayor Bernard Carvalho Jr. said Wednesday that the project is a top priority for the county.

The site offered by Grove Farm is located in the rural area of Kapaia.

Several other potential sites have been selected over the years, but the project never moved beyond planning stages.

The proposal calls for construction of a 10-bed facility capable of offering acute in-patient care. The proposed facility would also offer outpatient and aftercare treatment programs.

County officials said the costs of building and operating the facility could total millions of dollars. The county has not yet committed to providing those funds.

### Honolulu Boy Choir spring concert may have been its last

HONOLULU — After celebrating its 40th anniversary last year, The Honolulu Boy Choir may be coming to an end.

The Honolulu Star-Advertiser reported the choir's board of directors has said the organization is dealing with internal issues and hopes to find solutions in coming months.

The board found out that the choir's 501(c)(3) non-profit status had expired after the longtime executive director, Blake Nuibe, resigned in December.

Board Treasurer Michelle Saito said the choir lost its nonprofit status years ago, which is why it has been unable to receive donations.

The choir has also struggled with attracting members. The choir has about two dozen boys today, far less than the 150 boys it had during its prime.

Rev. David Rivers, whose son is a member, said he's hopeful the organization will continue.

from KCH's operating costs, Kreuzer said.

The skilled nursing beds are not being de-licensed, and should funding be available, the service could be reopened in the future, administrators said. The unit has averaged six patients a day while the operating cost has remained fixed, said administrators who noted that those services can be obtained at other facilities around West Hawaii.

Skilled nursing provides care to patients who are not yet well enough to go home but are not considered in need of acute care.

"Our intent is to hopefully reopen when our finances improve," Kreuzer said. "We intend this to be temporary."

The cuts do not affect Kohala Hospital, the second facility in the West Hawaii Region. The plan must still be ratified by the HHSC Board of Directors, and addresses only the coming fiscal year. As a longer-term solution, KCH is moving toward a public-private partnership similar to the Maui hospitals, Kreuzer said.

A public meeting to gather input on the workforce reduction and service closure plan is set for Monday at 5:30 p.m. at the hospital's administration building, conference rooms 2 and 3.

follows The news the announcement last month of plans to plug a \$7 million hole in the East Hawaii Region by cutting psychiatric and home care services at Hilo Medical Center and reducing the number of long-term beds at two other facilities.

At a recent public meeting before cuts are finalized, the public asked East Hawaii administrators to come up with other ways of meeting the budget shortfall than cutting health care jobs in an already underserved community. The state's hospital safety net system — beleaguered by low Medicaid and Medicare reimbursement

# Hole in door not caused by bullet, Subaru says

No, the Subaru Telescope didn't take a bullet.

Saeko Hayashi, a spokeswoman for the Mauna Kea observatory, said Monday morning that an approximately 9 mm hole in a metal door at the telescope was caused by it hitting a bolt sticking out from an intake manifold next to the side entrance.

On Sunday, the observatory said in a statement that an employee found what "appears to be a bullet hole" Saturday evening.

Police issued a press release that day saying they were investigating

the incident. further But, upon examination, it became clear that the hole lines up with the bolt and that the damage was not new, Hayashi said in a phone interview.

"When they opened the door all the way out, the hole matched the fixture that's sticking out from the wall," she said.

"You don't want to be standing between the door and the wall."

confirmed Monday afternoon that the bolt was responsible for creating the hole. The damage had been there for about six months, they said in a statement.

The damage was first noticed by a day crew and the door, which is used infrequently, was modified to prevent it from opening so widely, Hayashi said.

It wasn't known if an employee was opening the door when the damage occurred, but strong winds might be to blame, she said. At times, the metal door can shrink because of cold temperatures and that might have allowed it to open on its own, Hayashi said.

"The day crews knew the presence of the hole at the time of the severe winter storm earlier this year," telescope director Nobuo Arimoto said in an email. "The wrap-around effect of the wind could be very severe at times, which can swing the heavy metal door to create this kind of dent on the wall."

Hayashi said it was a relief to find it wasn't caused by a bullet.

of tense," she said, referring to the current standoff regarding the Thirty Meter Telescope.

The 8.2-meter telescope is operated by the National Astronomical Observatory of Japan, which is a partner in the TMT project.

### English requirment a practical idea but also a form of racism

My views have been described by some as "racist." True perhaps, but I have never uttered or committed the act of "racism." Race is not an easy topic to be discussed in Hawaii particularly because all foreigners (haole) are compelled to reject that idea. Native Hawaiians in truth are the only people in Hawaii to be subjected to racism. If other ethnicities are to validate their presence in Hawaii, it certainly could not be premised on racism. Racism being defined as ones' exploitation of another race in favor of ones' own race.

When I read letters from folks who think that everyone in Hawaii should speak English, I admit from a practical standpoint it makes sense. But to justify that by saying "after all this is America," in my opinion, represents a deep seeded and ingrained form of racism that resides within the English-speaking American of European origins.

Guys, wake up. The English language is of European origin. America is myth, named after an Italian cartographer named Amerigo Vispucci. ### Rand the reckless

ASHINGTON
— Rand Paul's presidential campaign, by many recent accounts, is sputtering. The candidate, according to The Atlantic's Molly Ball, is "flailing." His campaign, reports National Journal's Josh Kraushaar, has been called a "disaster."

These judgments, even if true, are provisional. Pretty much any candidate in the Republican pack is one killer debate performance, one strong poll result, one especially good fundraising report away from a narrative of resurgence.

But there is little question that the initial, ineffable appeal of the Paul campaign has faded. In March 2013, when Paul filibustered against the government's possible use of Hellfire missiles to murder civilians in San Francisco cafes and Houston restaurants — this seemed to make sense to some people at the time – many conservatives were swept away. "His voice, once lonely," wrote Noah Rothman, "grew in stature. ... It was poetic. It was romantic.

Compare this to Paul's recent filibuster of the Patriot Act. The Senate gallery was staged with supporters wearing "Stand With Rand" T-shirts. Paul's online campaign store offered a "filibuster starting pack" for \$30, including a "spy blocker" for your computer's video camera and a shirt reading



"The NSA knows I bought this Rand Paul T-shirt." Paul's Senate colleagues found themselves dragged into the middle of an infomercial, And many were not pleased.

Once it was Mr. Smith goes to Washington. Now it is Mr. Smith uses Senate procedure to conduct a fundraising campaign on a national security issue that he distorts to serve his political interests.

his political interests. The romance is gone. The bitterness and conspiratorial hints remain. Paul recently blamed the rise of the Islamic State on Republican "hawks Under pressure, Paul conceded, "I could have stated it better." But this was a gaffe of excessive clarity. Paul's foreign policy libertarianism is founded on the belief that an aggressively fought war against terrorism actually produces terrorism — that America has somehow earned the enmity it faces.

And Paul's accusation goes further. "People here in town [Washington, D.C.] think I'm making a huge mistake," he said on the Senate floor. "Some of them I think secretly want there to be an attack on the United States so they can blame it on me."

Paul likes to present himself as a voice of reason and outreach. But he is prone to rhetorical recklessness. Which of Paul's rivals, in this case, would be secretly pleased about the killing of Americans if it helped justify a political argument? Any names? Paul, by his account, is not only facing opponents but monsters.

According to Paul, it is "hawks" and "neocons" who "glory for war," who "really think war's always the answer." Some, as we've seen, "secretly want there to be an attack on the United States." Sen. John McCain wants "15 wars more." Paul has accused former Vice President Dick Cheney of supporting the Iraq War in order to benefit his former employer, Halliburton. Paul's charges are often nasty, often ad hominem, often involve the questioning of motives. In democratic discourse, this type of argument is a conversation stopper. How can you find agreement with scheming warmongers?

Paul sometimes apologizes, at least partially, for his sweeping hyperbole. But he falls into this habit frequently, and almost always on foreign policy matters. This reveals much about Paul's sense of political calling. He presents himself as someone engaged in a quest against sinister forces — a quest to dismantle the national security state, in both commitments abroad and surveillance at home. And the main obstacles to this goal are not Democrats (Paul often shares foreign policy views with President Obama), they are promilitary Republicans.

Paul's wink-and-nod

primary strategy winking toward his father's libertarian base, nodding toward establishment foreign policy thinking has collapsed. Paul was always more comfortable on the Snowden side of the national security ramparts. During the Patriot Act debate, by strategy or ideological compulsion, this showed. Limiting the reach and authority of American intelligence services at a time of Chinese cyberaggression and online Islamist radicalization would be a core mission

of a Paul presidency. Yet Paul succeeded, in part. Republican leaders in the House and Senate could not muster the votes to defend the Patriot Act in its original form, and had to accept a system that further restricts access to bulk data. The cost for Paul was to abandon the pretense of ideological moderation, and to embrace a rhetorically, and substantively, reckless course. ### The SEC's steady hand

ary Jo White is a rarity in Washington a seasoned federal prosecutor, an expert on securities law and a true independent, in both party registration and attitude. Those attributes made her President Barack Obama's choice to chair the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC), the independent agency that makes and enforces regulations for the financial industry. One of White's first acts upon taking office two years ago was

to declare that "we make

our decisions based on an

impartial assessment of

the law and the facts and

what we believe will further our mission — and never in response to political pressure, lobbying, or even public clamor." It was a much-needed

attempt to restore the SEC's standing after years in which its reputation, like that of the markets themselves, had declined. Even before White took office, the five-member commission seemed ineffectual at heading off frauds such as Enron, and plagued by the same partisan polarization spreading through the rest of Washington. Formerly consensual, more and more SEC decisions were made along partisan lines

or delayed because of internal disagreement. Congress hasn't helped, with Republicans blasting the SEC for allegedly wrapping business in red tape and Democrats accusing it of coddling Wall Street crooks.

Exhibit A: an extraor-

dinary June 2 letter from Sen. Elizabeth Warren, D-Mass., to White, 13 pages long, accusing the SEC chairwoman of "extremely disappointing" leadership — including the implication, vigorously denied by White, that she misled the senator in a recent meeting. Warren made clear she is particularly incensed

the SEC hasn't finalized a rule requiring publicly held companies to disclose the ratio between their chief executives' compensation and the median compensation of their employees, as per the 2010 Dodd-Frank financial reform law.

Warren has a point:

Five years is a long wait; no doubt the SEC could have conjured some plausible formula by now. Still, this is not the most urgent problem imaginable. The troubling disproportion between executive and worker pay is hardly a secret, nor is it clearly material

to investors, who are the

intended audience of SEC disclosure forms. The task of writing an SEC rule that conveys meaningful, statistically valid information and stands up to court challenge is complex — which is one good-faith reason that White would have trouble producing one, even if the other four commissioners were not divided over the issue, as they are.

A similar argument

A similar argument applies to Warren's claim that White has failed to get enough companies to admit wrongdoing when they settle allegations out of court with the SEC. This, too, is not

a no-brainer. Enhanced

accountability is the upside of insisting on such admissions; the downside is exposing companies to the risk of private lawsuits, which makes them less willing to settle, and pay fines, in the first place.

The SEC's work, in

The SEC's work, in short, necessarily involves judgment calls, bound to displease at least someone. What we can expect from the agency, however, is a genuinely independent process, free of pressure and clamor, as White said. We see no evidence that she has failed to deliver on that aspiration and much evidence that she was right to declare it.

# G-7 set far-off goal to move away from fossil fuels

ELMAU, Germany -The world should move away from using fossil fuels by the end of this century, G-7 leaders said Monday, setting an ambitious but distant goal ahead of a global conference on climate change this year.

The leaders of seven wealthy democracies also warned Russia that sanctions imposed for its actions against Ukraine would remain until a cease-fire is fully observed in eastern Ukraine - and those sanctions could be made tougher if the situation requires.

German Chancellor Angela Merkel, whose turn it was to host the annual gathering, pressed for a commitment to "decarbonize" the global economy — that is, to eliminate most carbon dioxide emissions from burning oil, gas and coal. While the goal was set for the end of the century, the seven leaders also asserted that "urgent and concrete action is needed to address climate change."

Burning fossil fuels produces carbon dioxide, which traps the sun's heat and warms the atmosphere.

The leaders agreed to press for a reduction, by 2050, of 40 to 70 percent in the 2010 global emission levels of the greenhouse gases blamed for global warming. The range was a disappointment to some environmental activists, but the leaders added they recommended the "upper end" of that range. They also said they would commit to a "transformation of the energy sectors" in their countries to produce fewer carbon emissions.

The word "decarbonization" is used to mean the replacement of carbon-based fossil fuels by alternative sources such as wind and solar power. The term is open to interpretations that include the use of some fossil fuels.

A German government spokesman said that as used by Merkel the word meant "substantial" emission reductions in the next decades and "near zero" greenhouse gas emissions by the end of the century.

Merkel set climate change as a key topic for the gathering, just like she did the last time she hosted it in 2007.

Her goal was to come up with a united stance among the group's advanced economies in order to better advocate for the goals at a much broader conference on how to combat global warming to be held Nov. 30 through Dec. 11 in Paris. The thinking was that negotiations with other countries — including major greenhouse gas emitters such as China and India — would be easier if the developed world took a united position.

Ulf Moslener, professor of sustainable energy finance at the Frankfurt School of Finance & Management, said the G-7 statement was "largely a confirmation of what has already been agreed" on climate change. Its chief value was in getting the developed countries on the same page ahead of climate change negotiations with developing countries.

Moslener said the steep reduction implied by

Merkel and President Barack Obama devoted much of their oneon-one meeting during the summit to Ukraine, where renewed fighting has broken out in recent days. Western nations and NATO accuse Russia of sending troops and weapons into Ukraine to support pro-Russian separatist fighters, something Russia denies.

A peace deal struck at Minsk in February requires a halt to fighting between the separatists and Ukrainian forces, and heavy weapons such as artillery and rocket launchers to be pulled back from the front line

"There was a lot of consensus with regard to Ukraine," Merkel said. "We agreed that the lifting of sanctions is tied to the implementation of the Minsk peace deal. And we are ready, should the circumstances warrant which we don't want - to increase sanctions."

Still, G-7 nations aren't totally united on what to do about Russian support for the separatists. Britain and the U.S. have sent limited help to train Ukraine's military, while



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
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

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# Blanca nears coast of Mexico as tropical depression

WEST HAWAII TODAY

The center of Tropical Depression Blanca was expected to move over portions of the central Baja California peninsula Monday through today, forecasters with the National Hurricane Center said.

Blanca, as of Monday afternoon Hawaii time, was packing 35 mph winds and moving toward the north-northwest at about 17 mph. The second named storm of the 2015 Eastern Pacific hurricane season was located about 60 miles south-southwest of Santa Rosalia, Mexico, and was expected to pass over or near the central Baja California by today, forecasters said.

Tropical storm warnings and watches were lifted Monday afternoon for areas of the coast of Mexico. The depression is expected to continue weakening and should be downgraded to a remnant

low by today.

Forecasters on Monday were also monitoring showers and thunderstorms associated with an area of low pressure that have become better organized. Forecasters said environmental conditions should remain conducive for a tropical depression to form this week as it moves slowly toward the northwest. They gave the low pressure system a 60 percent of forming into a tropical cyclone within 48 hours and a 90 percent chance of formation within five days.

# Parachute fails to inflate during NASA test off Kauai

HONOLULU — A parachute failed during a NASA test of new technology for landing larger spacecraft — and eventually astronauts — on Mars, the agency said Monday.

The parachute deployed but failed to inflate, Kimberly Newton, a spokeswoman for NASA, said in an email. The agency plans to provide more details during a news conference on Tuesday, she said. The parachute appeared to disintegrate in a video of the test.

The test off Kauai was investigating technology designed to slow down a large landing vehicle falling through the atmosphere at supersonic speeds.

Another giant parachute also failed to inflate during a similar NASA test of new Mars spacecraft technology last year. One of the main goals this year was to test the redesigned parachute.

The descent started 34

miles above the Earth's surface, where the environment is similar to Mars' thin atmosphere.

The agency first tested

a doughnut-shaped ring designed to inflate and slow down the flying saucer-shaped landing vehicle. The giant parachute was then expected to slow the descent further.

The technology being tested won't be used on missions anytime soon. NASA may decide not to use the technology if it fails the test.

NASA has said it wants

to send astronauts to Mars in the 2030s.

The supersonic parachute is 100 feet in diameter, about twice as big as the one that carried the Curiosity rover to Mars in 2012. It's so big it won't fit in the wind tunnels NASA typically uses to test parachutes.

The agency has been using the same basic parachute design to slow

vehicles upon approaching Mars since twin Viking landers touched down on the planet in 1976.

For the test, a giant balloon carried the landing vehicle 23 miles into the atmosphere. From there, a booster rocket lifted it to 34 miles where the descent began.

Monday's flight test was the second of three NASA plans for the project.

recovery — construction. Local builders say, and county permit data confirm, that construction is up. The first 10 months of 2014, the latest data available from the county Department of Research and Development, shows the number of building permits up 18.2 percent, and their value is up 28.5 percent compared to the first 10 months of 2013.

Construction jobs, on the other hand, show a dismal 2.7 percent decrease the first four months of this year, compared to the first four months of 2014, according to UHERO data. There are 300 fewer construction jobs on the Big Island this compared to last year.

"The construction industry has begun to add a moderate number of jobs on Oahu and Maui, but there are no signs of life yet on the Big Island or Kauai," the report

builders also indicate construction is up. He said there are several possible reasons for the disconnect between the construction and the jobs data. It's possible construction companies are using job agencies for their workers, for example, which could move the construction jobs into a different

category, such as business services.

It's also possible that building is concentrating in areas that don't use as many workers, such as poured concrete and multifamily homes. HPM Building Supply, for example, is panelizing, or prefabricating, housing components at its Keaau

facility, resulting in fewer workers at construction

Andrew Tyner, contractor sales manager at HPM Building Supply, said he's seeing a lot of builder confidence, new builders joining the scene and builders returning to projects that may have sat idle since 2008, when the recession

"We've really seen the trend in the last two years," Tyner said. "There's a lot more buyer confidence. ... All really positive signs for development."

### Lightning take 2-1 lead over Blackhawks

CHICAGO - Victor Hedman had two assists for Tampa Bay while playing stout defense on Chicago's top forwards and the Lightning beat the Blackhawks 3-2 in Game 3 of the Stanley Cup Final on Monday night.

Ryan Callahan, Ondrej Palat and Cedric Paquette scored as Tampa Bay used its second straight win to take a 2-1 lead in the best-of-seven series. Ben Bishop made 36 saves in a gutsy performance after he was questionable coming into the game. Game 4 is Wednesday night.

Brad Richards and Brandon Saad scored for Chicago, and Corey Crawford finished with 29 stops.

The third consecutive one-goal game in the final was tied at 1 after two periods, and then tied again after the teams exchanged goals in a 13-second burst in the third. But Hedman helped the Lightning take the lead for good when he skated into the corner and made a perfect pass to Paquette in the middle for his third goal of the playoffs with 3:11 remaining, silencing the United Center crowd.

Bishop and company held up down the stretch as the Lightning improved to 8-3 on the road in the playoffs.

Tampa Bay wasted a chance to go in front in the second after Saad was whistled for goaltender's interference, creating a 5-on-3 opportunity. Bishop, who was a gametime decision with some sort of issue left over from Game 2, was shaken up on the collision, but staved in the net. Crawford then made a couple of big saves to help the Blackhawks kill off the power-play time, leading to roars of approval from the crowd of 22,336.

Marian Hossa made a slick pass to set up Saad's seventh goal at 4:14 of the third, giving the Blackhawks a 2-1 lead. But the Lightning came right down and scored when Palat stuffed in a rebound for his eighth of the playoffs.

After nearly two days' worth of speculation, Bishop led the Lightning out of the tunnel for warmups and got the start in goal. He participated in the morning skate, but there was no definitive word on his status until he was announced as the starter right before the



"Obviously, we were a bit nervous," Rapinoe said. "Couldn't play a lot worse at times."

U.S. star forward Alex Morgan, sidelined by a bone bruise in her left knee, entered in the 79th minute in her first game action with April 11 with her Portland club.

Rapinoe scored in the 12th minute for the Americans, Press put the U.S. ahead for good in the 61st, and Rapinoe added her 31st international goal in the 78th, the first two-goal game at the World Cup for the Americans since Abby Wambach against Norway in 2007.

The U.S., which won the title in 1991 and '99, improved to 5-0-2 in World Cup openers and 23-0-2 in all matches against Australia. The game was televised in prime time on network television back home, where large numbers of fans tuned in last year for the men's World Cup in Brazil.

"Couldn't be prouder to have the women of Team #USA representing us in stars, stripes, and shin guards. Good luck," Democratic president candidate Hillary Clinton tweeted.

In the absence of the 25-year-old Morgan, 35-year-old Abby Wambach and Canadaborn Sydney Leroux started up top against the No. 10 Matildas, whose best World Cup finish was sixth in 2007

While the American women have won three straight Olympic gold medals, the third World Cup title has eluded them. They lost the 2011 final to Japan on penalty The field has expanded

from 16 teams to 24 this year, and the Americans' next match in Group D will be Friday against Sweden and former U.S. coach Pia Sundhage. They finish group play on June 16 against Nigeria, which tied Sweden 3-3 in the opener of Monday's doubleheader. The World Cup is

being played as FIFA deals with a scandal which U.S. prosecutors allege involves more then \$150 million in bribes. FIFA President Sepp Blatter, who is not at the tournament, announced last week that he plans to resign.

HILO -- The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) Division of Forestry and Wildlife (DOFAW) will conduct animal control activities specifically for trapping mouflon/feral sheep hybrids; staff hunting, and/or aerial shooting from helicopters for feral goats, feral sheep, mouflon and mouflon/feral sheep hybrids within palila critical habitat in the Mauna Kea Forest Reserve (Unit A), Mauna Kea Ice Age Natural Area Reserve (Unit K), and the Kaohe Game Management Area (Unit G) on the island of Hawaii. Aerial shooting is required for compliance with the federal court order mandating the removal of sheep and goats from critical habitat for palila, a bird endemic to Hawaii.

Control schedules are June 24 and 25, July 28 and 29, and August 26 and 27, 2015.

Public access to Mauna Kea Forest Reserve from Waikahalulu gulch, north to Kemole, and east to Puu Kole, Mauna Kea Ice Age Natural Area Reserve, the Kaohe Game Management Area and Mauna Kea Hunter Access Road will be restricted and allowed BY PERMIT ONLY for animal salvage purposes on the following dates:

7 a.m. June 24 and 25, July 28 and 29, and August 26 and 27, 2015

These actions are pursuant to HAR§ 13-130-19 and § 13-104-23(a) (3). The Mauna Kea Observatory Road will remain open. The temporary closure is needed to minimize the dangers of incompatible uses in the forest area and safely conduct animal control activities. To implement the closure, the Halepohaku and Kilohana gated entrances to Unit A and G and the gate behind Mauna Kea State Recreation Area will be locked/reopened as follows:





uick complete this phrase: Cool as a . If you thought cucumber, you are probably in the majority, but exactly what does that phrase mean? Well, let's consider the cucumber in culinary terms: it offers a refreshing, palatecleansing astringency that "cools" the mouth after a bite of spicy food. The cucumber is thought to have originated in Thailand or India, where its mild, crisp flavor is a perfect foil for curries and other foods from those countries. For pupus, cucumbers can be cool "platforms" for a variety of toppings. Slicing them into pitchers of water, or juicing into smoothies are other ways they can refresh.

Low in calories and high in fiber, cucumbers also offer a little vitamin C, folate and potassium.



cucumbers with smooth, brightly colored skins; avoid any with shriveled or soft spots. Cucumbers with small seeds are best; older ones with bigger seeds can taste bitter and need the seeds removed. The English, or Hothouse cucumber is virtually seedless. Store them whole and unwashed in a plastic bag in the refrigerator up to 10 days. Wash just before using. And stay cool.

### **Asian cucumber** ribbon salad

This is an easy and refreshing salad that you should make about 15 minutes before

Mince walnuts in a food processor, being careful not to make a paste. In a Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, for five minutes. Remove from heat; stir in the walnuts. Set mixture aside to cool. Cut cucumber into 3-inch rounds and core, then cut each round into quarters. Spoon a little miso and walnut mixture on each section. Top with a piece of walnut and chill until ready to serve.

### **Cucumber boats** with bay shrimp

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# CHILL OUT WITH GRANITA

Granita (pronounced grah-NEE-tah) is the name for an Italian ice of rough, jagged crystals. It melts the minute it hits your tongue, sending a shiver of cold straight down the throat. The classic flavors are lemon and coffee, but granita comes in other flavors too, including one made with jasmine. The ultimate, though, has to be the almond granita made from an infusion of crushed almonds in water served with warm brioche for breakfast at Caffe Sicilia in Noto, Sicily.

In fact, the inspiration for Sicily's slushy ice comes from the Arabs who once ruled the island. And over the centuries, granita has become a tradition over much of southern Italy. In 19th century Naples, colorful carts festooned with lemons used to dispense granita di limone at the height of summer.

The mystery is why granita rarely shows up on Italian menus in Los Angeles, edged out by gelato and sorbetto made in gelato machines that do all the work

For the home cook, the beauty of granita is that it doesn't require a fancy ice cream or gelato machine. All you need is a shallow metal or glass baking pan and a fork. Really. And some

spectacular fruit.

Since the ice involves no dairy, it's a purist's dessert, highlighting sweet, juicy tangerines or fragrant lemons.

In Provence, a cook friend once looked out the window of the house we were renting and spied a cherry tree loaded with fruit. Soon we

were gleefully squeezing cherries with our hands to get the crimson juice. A couple of hours later, we were spooning jaggedy ice crystals of cherry granita into our mouths in the dark.

To make granita, start with 3 or 4 cups of freshly squeezed fruit juice - cherry, lemon (cut with water), tangerine, blood orange, grape, even pureed melon or peaches. You can, of course, make it with juice you buy, but the result won't taste as vibrant.

Add sugar (preferably fine baker's sugar) or simple syrup to taste, just sweeter than you'd like to drink it. (After freezing, the granita will taste much less sweet.) How big the crystals get depends on how much sugar is in the mix. Less sugar, bigger ice crystals.

Pour the mixture into a shallow baking pan. Ideally, the liquid shouldn't be much more than an inch deep or it will take a long time to form the ice crystals.

Place the pan in the freezer. After about an hour, check to see if ice has started to form on top and around the edges. If not, wait some more. Once you can see the ice, take that fork and scrape the ice crystals into the middle. Come back a half-hour later, scrape again. Repeat several times until all

the liquid is frozen.

Just before serving, fluff up the granita with the fork and serve it heaped into footed ice cream bowls or wine glasses. (If the granita is too firm, let the container stand out at room temperature for a few minutes before serving.)

Now that barbecue season is here in earnest, served after grilled chops and sausages, or carne asada with all the fixings, a tangerine granita is refreshing and light. Serve it with cookies or even a scoop of vanilla bean ice cream, the way chef Jennifer Naylor used to do at Wolfgang Puck's Malibu restaurant, Granita.

### **Tangerine (or other** citrus) granita

10 minutes, plus freezing time. Serves four to six

2 1/2 cups tangerine and blood orange juice (or other citrus juice), pulp strained

2 to 4 tablespoons superfine sugar, or to taste

Combine the juice and 2 tablespoons sugar, whisking until the sugar is dissolved. Taste and add additional sugar as desired; the mixture should be sweet (the sweetness will fade as the granita freezes).

Pour into a shallow baking dish so the mixture comes up the sides approximately 1 inch.

Freeze, checking occasionally to see when ice begins to form on the top and sides, after an hour or so, and begin scraping the ice crystals into the center of the pan with a fork.

Continue to freeze, scraping occasionally, until there is no more liquid in the pan. Just before serving, fluff the crystals with a fork. Serve heaped into ice cream bowls or wine glasses.

If you are making a lemon granita, cut the lemon juice with water just as you would for lemonade.

# Espresso granita is refreshing, but not too sweet

Why mess with success? San Francisco's Zuni Cafe follows the same basic recipe from Judy Rodgers' 2002 "Zuni Cafe Cookbook" that you see here. Almost equal parts whipped cream and granita, it remains not overly sweet

and qui te refreshing. Be sure to start with

a strong, rich espresso; do not use instant. From the Zuni

Cafe pastry kitchen; makes 8 servings.

2 1/2 cups freshly brewed espresso, at room temperature

3/4 cup plus 3 tablespoons sugar, or more as needed

1 cup water

1/2 cup chilled heavy whipping cream

Kosher salt

Pour the espresso into a mixing bowl. Add 3/4 cup sugar and stir until dissolved. Taste it; it should seem a bit too sweet. If it doesn't, add extra sugar by the

1/4 teaspoon until it does. Stir in the water. Pour into a shallow stainless-steel or glass pan that's large enough so the mixture is no more than 1 inch deep. Freeze until solid; this may take up to 8 hours.

Choose a glass, plastic or metal container with a tight-fitting lid. Make sure it is dry, snap on the lid and place it in the freezer.

Once the espresso mixture has frozen solid, place the pan on a cool surface. Use a metal pastry scraper to cut a grid of evenly spaced lines, left to right and then top to bottom (to create squares). Use the scraper to gently toss the granita, then transfer it to the cold container. Cover and freeze for at least 30 minutes.

Meanwhile, combine the heavy whipping cream, the 3 tablespoons of sugar and the salt in the bowl of a stand mixer or handheld electric mixer. Beat on mediumlow speed until frothy, then on high speed until soft peaks form.

Just before serving, gently toss the granita with a large fork (to redistribute any separated sugar).

Layer the granita and

dollops of whipped cream alternately, parfait-style,

in chilled serving glasses.

There should be almost as much whipped cream as granita. Serve right away.

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# Teacher questions sham graduations

**Dear Annie:** Graduation is coming up, and I don't know

what to do. You see, most of the seniors aren't qualified to graduate at all. Some of them have been truant for half of the years they were here. At least 15 seniors were absent from class for their entire senior year, and at least 20 percent lack grade-level reading and writing skills. For some,

college will be impossible. Every year, we have "alumni" who return to school because they either graduated without necessary credentials or flunked out of college and need academic help. I never give passing grades to kids who don't show up to class, but if they perform some token service, the school graduates them anyway.

Should I go to this year's graduation ceremony? I haven't gone in two years, and when asked, I say why. Sometimes I worry that I appear unkind, because this is a low-income, troubled neighborhood and high school graduation means a lot to these families. I just don't like what I see as a deception because either the parents haven't made sure the kids go to school, or the school lies to the kids and tells them everything is fine. What do you suggest? - Teacher

**Dear Teacher:** There is only so much you can do, and you are already doing it. We understand that you don't feel it is fair for kids to graduate when they haven't done the work, shown up for class or achieved the required standards. You are already giving these kids flunking grades. But unless the other teachers and the school administration are willing to hold them back, they will graduate anyway. And your school is not the only one that operates in this fashion.

While it serves no purpose for parents or kids to believe graduation will happen whether



or not it's deserved, for some, the humiliation of not graduating doesn't spur them to achieve

more. It makes them give up. Ask yourself what you hope to accomplish as an educator, and then seek the best way to achieve it.

**Dear Annie:** I have a friend who, after lots of medical assistance, was finally able to get pregnant and have a little girl 18 months ago. Now, with further assistance, she is pregnant with twins.

It's exciting but expensive to give a baby shower. What is the
