Weakened ethics bill trudging along

NEXT HEARING ON BILL 37 POSTPONED UNTIL OCT. 21

weakened attempting to tighten county ethics standards is trudging toward its eighth hearing this year before the Hawaii County Council, as council members work to hack off all the offending pieces.

Bill 37, now in its fourth draft since it was

sponsored in March by Kohala Councilwoman Margaret Wille, on Wednesday was postponed until Oct. 21. A similar bill sponsored by Mayor Billy Kenoi in 2009 bounced for months between the County Council and Board of Ethics, without winning approval by either body.

Wille still has high hopes for her bill.

"This is aimed toward raising the ethical standards that are expected of county employees," Wille said.
"I do think it's important. What we can do is take little steps

to raise awareness and consciousness and give people more trust in their

government." "lit-The

tle steps" have been getting increasingly smaller since the bill started off, particularly pertaining to allowing county employees and

their immediate families to hold county contracts for their own outside

business at the same time they're employed by the county.

The versions of the bill started with an absolute ban, which then became a ban on contracts over \$10,000, then on contracts over \$50,000, and finally, returned to allowing the contracts as long as the county employee clears it with the Board of Ethics first.

"A dollar figure has nothing to do with ethical behavior," said Hilo Councilman Aaron Chung, supporting the most recent change.

Wille, facing a 5-4 vote in favor or a 4-5 vote in opposition, has been amenable to changes from other council members, apparently figuring


animal, including the lessthan-choice cuts. As it was so aptly put by those who have been part of the event for successive years: "Everything from tongue to tail."

Tropical Storm Nora forms far southeast of Big Island

Tropical Storm Nora, the 14th named storm of the 2015 Eastern Pacific hurricane season, formed Friday afternoon far southeast of the Big Island.

Located 1,470 miles east-southeast of the Big Island, Nora was circulating 40 mph winds and tracking west at 16 mph as of 5 p.m. Friday, National Hurricane Center forecasters said. Tropical stormforce winds extended outward up to 45 miles from its center.

Steady strengthening is expected this weekend as Nora moves over very warm waters and encounters little wind shear. Forecasters expect to upgrade Nora to a hurricane as early as Sunday evening after it enters the Central Pacific on Saturday. Current forecast models have Nora peaking as a Category 1 hurricane packing 90 mph winds on Monday evening about 800 miles east-southeast of

Businesses reminded of deadline for renewal reports

The state Department Commerce and Affairs' Consumer **Business** Registration Division reminds businesses to file their annual business renewal reports.

Renewals due in the fourth quarter are now available online at http:// hbe.ehawaii.gov/annuals and must be filed with BREG by midnight Dec. 31. Accepted forms of payment online include credit card, eCheck or through eHawaii.gov subscriber accounts.

Hawaii annual business renewals can be filed at any time during the quarter in which the annual filing is due. The quarters are as follows: First quarter is January to March; second quarter is April to June; third quarter is July to September; fourth quarter is October to December.

If a 2015 Hawaii annual business renewal was due in a previous quarter, owners can submit the filing online with a \$10 late fee. Any filing that is late a year or more can be filed by mail, fax or walk-in at the BREG office at 335 Merchant St. and will be assessed a late fee of \$10 per year.



The National Dialogue Quartet, democracy group in Tunisia, wins Nobel Peace Prize

OSLO, Norway — A Tunisian democracy group won the Nobel Peace Prize on Friday for its contributions to the first and most successful Arab Spring movement.

The Norwegian Nobel Committee cited the Tunisian National Dialogue Quartet "for its decisive contribution to the building of a pluralistic democracy" in the North African country following its 2011 revolution.

"It established an alternative, peaceful political process at a time when the country was on the brink of civil war," the committee said in its citation.

The prize is a huge victory for small Tunisia, whose young and still shaky democracy suffered two extremist attacks this year that killed 60 people and devastated the

Tunisian protesters sparked uprisings across the Arab world in 2011 that overthrew dictators and upset the status quo. Tunisia is the only country in the region to painstakingly build a democracy, involving a range of political and social forces in dialogue to create a constitution, legislature and democratic institutions.

Islamic State group seizes string of villages north of Aleppo city in surprise attack

BEIRUT - Islamic State militants seized several villages from rival insurgents north of Aleppo city Friday, in a surprise attack that came despite intensive Russian airstrikes that Moscow insists are targeting the extremist group, activists said.

Iranian state media reported that a senior commander in Iran's powerful Revolutionary Guard was killed by the Islamic State group on the outskirts of Aleppo city, but it was not immediately clear whether Gen. Hossein Hamedani's death was related to the new IS offensive.

An Iranian state television report said he was killed while "carrying out an advisory mission." It didn't provide any further details. The official IRNA news agency read a statement by the Guard in which it blamed IS for his

The new developments come amid a wave of Russian airstrikes that have targeted insurgents fighting to topple President Bashar Assad, and a ground offensive by the Syrian army in the country's central region.

Moscow says it is targeting mainly Islamic State militants, but U.S. officials and Syrian rebels have said the strikes have hit mainstream rebels for the most part and are designed to shore up Assad's embattled government

Jerusalem mayor defends display of gun, saying he's keeping city safe

JERUSALEM — Jerusalem's mayor, caught on video this week with a gun slung over his shoulder while visiting a Palestinian neighborhood, is making no apologies for the display of force. He says he's helping keep his city

In an interview with The Associated Press, Nir Barkat urged other licensed gun owners to follow his lead, saying that Israel's plethora of well-trained army veterans gives the country an added edge as it confronts a wave of attacks carried out by Ione Palestinians.

"In Israel we're fortunate to have many ex-military and current military reservists that are professionals, well trained, they know how to fight. They know how to use weapons," said Barkat, himself a former Israeli paratrooper commander. "For us, it's an extra security measure that's not happening in the rest of the world.'

Barkat described Israel as caught in the midst of an unprecedented battle, with his city at the heart of the

The violence erupted last month during the Jewish new year with clashes at Jerusalem's most sensitive holy site, a hilltop compound revered by Muslim and Jews

Obama focusing on condolences, not gun laws, in visiting families of shooting victims

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama is bringin words of comfort and sympathy to grieving families of victims of the shooting rampage in Roseburg, Oregon, muting his message about the need for new laws to stem gun violence as he visits an area where firearms are popular.

Obama will talk with family members Friday at the start of a four-day West Coast trip. Eight community college students and a teacher were killed before the gunman fatally shot himself in front of his victims after he was wounded by police.

Staunchly conservative Douglas County is bristling with gun owners who use their firearms for hunting, target shooting and self-protection. A commonly held opinion in the area is that the solution to mass killings is more people carrying guns, not fewer.

'The fact that the college didn't permit guards to carry guns, there was no one there to stop this man," said Craig Schlesinger, pastor at the Garden Valley Church.

Referring to potential protesters, White House spokesman Josh Earnest said: "Those individuals have nothing to fear. The fact is the president has made clear that the goal of his visit is to spend time with the families of those who are so deeply affected by this terrible tragedy."

Researchers, food company look to serve consumers beef with a side of heart-healthy omega-3s

WICHITA, Kan. - Health-conscious consumers might be persuaded to eat more beef if it was fortified with heart-healthy omega-3 fatty acids naturally found in salmon and walnuts, according to researchers and some ranchers who are feeding cattle flaxseed — even marine algae — with an eye to offering another wholesome dinner choice.

People have long been told they can decrease their risk of heart disease by eating more omega-3 fatty acids, the kind salmon get from algae. It inspired researchers at Kansas State University: Could the steaks and hamburgers from cattle fattened on algae pass on those healthy

Separately, some Texas grocery stores are selling beef products fortified with omega-3 through flaxseed, a trial run so successful that orders have quadrupled since it began seven months ago. And a nationwide study shows consumers would be willing to pay \$1.85 a pound more for enriched steaks and 79 cents a pound more for enhanced ground beef, Kansas State agricultural economist Sean Fox said.

After putting a pot roast into her shopping basket at a Wichita grocery store, 31-year-old Lindsey Goodwin considered that very question. "Probably, it kind of depends on the price," she said.

But Terry Cooper, 36, was skeptical, adding that the university might have an "uphill battle" persuading people to eat more beef. "The reality is we all eat more junk food ... but we think we should eat healthy," Cooper said.

North Korea sending a message with massive military parade

SEOUL, South Korea North Korea, relatively small nation that it is, will do its best Saturday to convince the world - and particularly the United States — that it's not to be trifled with.

The North plans an exceptionally large display of its military power to mark the 70th anniversary of the founding of the ruling Workers' Party of Korea. Soldiers and citizens will gather in Pyongyang, the capital, for the main event: parade featuring goose-stepping soldiers, ballistic missile launchers, long-range self-propelled guns and slogans celebrating the party's

Pyongyang organizes carefully choreographed displays of military might to drum up patriotism and push the narrative that North Korea needs a strong military to withstand outside forces who wish it harm, analysts say.

"This large display is a way of demonstrating that North Korea is defying international pressure," said Bruce Klingner, senior research fellow at the Heritage Foundation in Washington.

Public gatherings are planned in cities around the country, and Daily NK, a Seoul-based news website with sources in North Korea, reported this week that North Koreans were put to work cleaning and decorating for the occasion. They also were ordered to give money to local officials, ostensibly to chip in for the costs of the celebration, the website reported.

Saturday's military parade is expected to be one of North Korea's biggest. Satellite images released this week by 38 North, a North Korean affairs website affiliated with Johns Hopkins University, showed that organizers have been gathering troops and equipment for the parade at an airbase near Pyongyang for the past six months. By August, there were more than 500 tents, 600 trucks and 170 armored and military vehicles at the air base, 38 North reported.

In the long lead-up to the big day, experts have speculated that North Korea would launch a rocket. The U.S. and United Nations consider such events a veiled way of testing ballistic missile technology amid fears that Pyongyang could seek to mount a nuclear warhead on a missile.

North Korea has not conducted a nuclear test since its third in early 2013, leading to speculation over when the next test could come. Since then, North Korea has regularly issued strongly worded statements arguing that the development of nuclear weapons is its right as a sovereign state.

But anxiety over a possible launch has faded. Late last month, 38 North released satellite imagery that showed no signs of preparation at the launch site that are usually detected at least a week or two in advance.

North Korea successfully launched a longrange rocket in 2012 but also has tried and failed twice. Earlier in 2012, a

launch intended to mark the centenary of founder Kim Il Sung's birth ended with the rocket breaking up and crashing into the

This time, experts say, Pyongyang may have decided to play it safe and avoid risking the embarrassment of a launch gone wrong.

One thing that hasn't changed is North Korea's wariness toward United States. The Korean War, which pitted the China-backed communist North against the U.S.-supported capitalist South, ended in 1953 with an armistice but no peace treaty. Pyongyang still considers the U.S. an enemy and sees American military bases in South Korea as an active threat.

The Workers' Party of Korea has had an uninterrupted grip on power in North Korea since the country was founded in 1948. The party is led by the Kim family dynasty, which is now in its third generation with young leader Kim Jong

Un. He took the helm in 2011 after the death of his father, Kim Jong Il.

In his appearance and demeanor, the younger Kim has made an effort to hark back to the rule of his grandfather. North Koreans generally remember the era of Kim Il Sung as a more stable time, when the country received aid from the Soviet Union and maintained a more effective system of state-issued rations. Though no longer a country of famine, the North remains poor and has resisted enacting the kind of market-oriented reforms that have brought higher living standards to China and Vietnam.

Although remains by far North Korea's most important ally and trading partner, their bilateral relationship has become frayed in recent years, with Beijing appearing to lose patience with the North over its refusal to give up its nuclear program.

Unlike a recent parade in Beijing to mark the defeat of Japan in World War II, Pyongyang's gathering is not expected to draw any heads of

Chinese President Xi Jinping "extended warm congratulations" to Kim on the party's anniversary, the official New China News Agency reported Friday, while Beijing dispatched Liu Yunshan, a high-ranking member of the Communist Party's Politburo standing committee, to attend the parade.

China's state-run Global Times tabloid hailed the visit as a "friendly and active move to maintain and smooth communication channel between the two countries" that "has given rise to expectations in the economic and social sectors."

the China-North Korea relationship remain opaque, and Chinese experts advised treating the news with caution.

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

Americans' aversion to dollar coins costs the nation billions

mericans waste a lot of money because of their aversion to coins and their fondness for dollar bills. If you travel almost anywhere else in the world, you won't find the same irrational attachment to low-value paper currency. In Britain, if you pay for something with a 20-pound note, you'll likely get 1-pound and even 5-pound coins in change. Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Japan and all major European nations have done away with their equivalent of the one-dollar bill.

But not America, where attempts to phase out the paper dollar have gone nowhere and dollar coins have failed to become popular. If a few members of Congress have their way, that could change.

Sens. John McCain, an Arizona Republican, and Mike Enzi, Republican from Wyoming, have introduced legislation to eliminate the dollar bill. Don't think this is a partisan issue, though. Democratic Sens. Mark Udall of Colorado and Tom Harkin of Iowa, are co-sponsors.

The Government Accountability Office has recommended the move for a long time. The reason is simple: Dollar coins, though more expensive to make, last much longer. The average dollar bill lasts only about four years. A dollar coin wouldn't need to be replaced for 30 years.

That translates into potentially very large savings — as much as \$13.8 billion over 30 years by some estimates.

Compared to the size of the entire budget, the annual savings might not seem like much, but it is real money, hundreds of millions of dollars every year that is simply wasted to appease an infatuation with paper.

So why has the legislation failed in the past? Politicians are afraid the American people, who have never embraced dollar coins, would be upset. This is one time where Washington really should ignore the will of the people, and elected leaders should lead.

The only way Americans will embrace dollar coins is if paper dollars aren't an option. That's become increasingly obvious as dollar coin after dollar coin has gone down in flames.

Some of this has been poor design. The original Eisenhower dollar coin was too large. The Susan B. Anthony was too easily mistaken for a quarter.

The presidential series of dollar coins the U.S. Mint began issuing in 2007 flopped, too, so badly that President Barack Obama ordered the Mint to stop producing them in bulk as a cost-cutting measure. Nearly half of the coins had been returned to the Federal Reserve, leaving the Fed with nearly 1.4 billion coins to store.

Clearly, the only way Americans will use dollar coins is if they are left with no choice.

Maybe Congress simply needs to do a better job of selling the public on the notion and informing the American people of the benefits. Concern about purses and pockets getting weighed down with too many coins simply isn't a valid reason to keep wasting so much cash on cash.

Polls show that Americans, when informed of the savings, do favor eliminating the dollar bill.

Here's one final selling point Congress could use: Just think how much more the average change jar would be worth when it is cashed in.

Let's focus on the gun makers

ASHINGTON – It's not just Congress that fails to respond after another massacre briefly focuses attention on the irrationality and permissiveness of our country's firearms statutes. Those of us seeking change also regularly fall down on the job. We express outrage and move on, leaving the debate exactly where we found it.

Opponents of the big gun interests are often insufficiently innovative in what we propose. Let's face it: We have been losing this fight

The solutions we suggest are rarely big enough to deal with the problem comprehensively. This opens up advocates of change to predictable attacks. This suggested law, gun-industry apologists say, would not have prevented *that* shooting. More broadly: How will your little proposals ever get a handle on guns when there are already more than 300 million of them on the streets? (Part of the answer: Deal with ammunition.)

Gun reformers put ourselves at a steep disadvantage from the outset. We often get angry at rank-and-file gun owners who, in turn, see us as elitist big-city folks who don't respect the traditions of those who have had weapons in their families for generations. Pro-reform politicians often don hunting outfits and shoot deer or birds



to curry favor with those who mistrust them. Mostly, the politicians look silly. Anybody can put on a costume.

The time has come to recast this battle as a fight to hold those who make billions of dollars from the sale of firearms accountable for what their products do to individuals and communities. We must call for corporate responsibility, and enforce it by law if it's not forthcoming. And President Barack Obama, whose outrage about guns many of us share, must be willing to go well beyond

what he has done so far. As is their way, the community organizers and activists at the Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF) are pushing the president to use the federal government's purchasing power to promote safer guns. To do business with the government, companies would have to be willing to "remove the barriers to getting smart guns and gun safety technologies to market" and cooperate with law enforcement to "identify and isolate dealers that provide large numbers

of guns used in crimes." Governments at all levels account for roughly 40 percent of gun industry revenues. The federal government alone accounts for about 25 percent. Taxpayers have a right to demand responsibility from an industry that gets so much of our money.

The president won't much like the slogan of a Metro IAF news conference, which was scheduled for Thursday across from the White House in Lafayette Square "Clergy and Citizens to President Obama: Stop Whining, Start Working to Curb Gun Deaths" But the former community organizer might appreciate this: Since his administration has been reluctant to use the taxpayers' power in the weapons marketplace to promote accountability from the big gun makers, outside pressure might make it easier for him to do the right thing.

He also faces prodding from his fellow Democrats. Both Hillary Clinton and Martin O'Malley have put forward comprehensive gun proposals that are more adventurous than the ideas Obama has embraced. O'Malley deserves particular credit for going far beyond the highly constricted gunpolicy conversation. His comprehensive plan includes a proposal that echoes the IAF in mandating that the federal government buy weapons only from manufacturers who adopt basic safety measures and the

microstamping of weapons.

Arnie Graf, a longtime IAF organizer, explains that microstamping can allow law enforcement to trace guns and bullets used in crimes. "Smart guns" that could be used only by their owner would vastly reduce trafficking, prevent accidents and diminish suicides. And since a relatively small number of dealers are responsible for the sale of a large number of weapons used in crime, focusing on those dealers (and demanding that the gun companies stop selling to them) could further reduce gun violence.

So let's talk less about the NRA and more about those whose interests the NRA serves, the big weapons sellers such as Sturm, Ruger & Co., Smith & Wesson, SIG Sauer, Beretta, Glock and Freedom Group. Police investigating Hilo attempted car theft and robbery

Hawaii Island police are on the lookout for two men who allegedly tried to steal a vehicle Thursday night in Hilo.

Patrol officers responding to a 9:35 p.m. call met with a 20-year-old Volcano man in a parking lot at the University of Hawaii at Hilo. The man reported that as he approached his parked sports-utility vehicle, he encountered a man inside, who apparently was attempting to steal it.

As the victim got closer, the suspect reportedly exited the SUV and entered the passenger side of a truck that was parked next to the SUV. The victim attempted to restrain the suspect, who then assaulted the victim, according to the Hawaii Police Department.

The truck left the parking lot and was last seen traveling west on West Kawili Street.

The victim suffered minor injuries during the incident, which is being investigated as an attempted second-degree robbery, but declined medical treatment.

The suspect is described as Caucasian, about 5 feet 7 to 5 feet 9 inches tall, weighing at least 200 pounds with a heavy build and a fair complexion. He was wearing pants and a T-shirt over a black long-sleeved shirt. His face was partly concealed.

Reservations are not required for Kulanaokuaiki. backcountry campgrounds along the coast, at Napau Crater Overlook, Pepeiao, and on Mauna Loa remain open and backpackers can obtain a backcountry permit from the backcountry office, located in the Visitor Emergency Operations Center up to 24 hours in advance. The backcountry office is open daily from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Shark bites surfer on Oahu's North Shore

HONOLULU (AP) - A 25-year-old Oahu man has been bit by a shark while surfing on Oahu's North Shore.

Honolulu Emergency Services Department spokesman Shayne Enright said the attack happened near a popular surfing spot known as Leftovers, about 3 miles away from the famed Banzai Pipeline.

Enright said a 911 call was received at 10:25 a.m. and the victim was already on the beach when rescue crews arrived.

The man had an injury to his left leg and cuts on his hands. The man was transported to Queens Medical Center for treatment in critical condition.

Enright said another surfer was with the man and helped him back to shore after the attack. There, people put the man on a surf or paddle board and used a leash as a tourniquet.

Public and charter school enrollments remain steady

Hawaii's public schools enrolled more than 180,000 students for the 2015-16 academic year, the state Department of Education reported Friday.

180,409 Some dents enrolled in the state Department of Education's 256 schools and 34 charter schools, compared with 180,895 in school year 2014-15, and 185,273 in 2013-14, according to the state. Of those 180,409 students, 169,987 are attending public schools; charter schools represent 5.8 percent of public school enrollment.

The greatest enrollment changes were recorded in kindergarten and first grade with an increase of 3,025 students and decrease of 4,076 students, respectively. The department said the change in enrollment could

be attributed to a legislative change to the kindergarten

Over the next several years, the department projects a stable enrollment rate due to birth rates.

City officials estimated that about 100 homeless people were affected by the two-day sweep that began Thursday.

Outreach workers canvassed the encampment before the sweeps began to inform people living there that buses would take them to shelters.

Divided House Republicans see savior in Paul Ryan

Endlessly divided, House Republicans pleaded with Rep. Paul Ryan on Friday to rescue them from their damaging leadership vacuum. But the GOP's 2012 vice presidential nominee showed little appetite for the prestigious yet thankless job of speaker of the House.

The Wisconsin Republican who chairs the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee — his dream job, he's repeatedly declared - refused comment again and again as reporters chased him around the Capitol a day

after Majority Leader Kevin McCarthy shocked his colleagues by withdrawing from the speaker's race moments before the vote.

McCarthy's abrupt decision came just two weeks after the current speaker, John Boehner of Ohio, announced his own plans to resign at month's end, citing opposition from the small but strident bloc of hardcore conservatives who almost turned on immediately McCarthy, Boehner's No. 2.

That left Republicans in chaos, with a yawning void at the top of their leadership ladder even as they confront enormous fiscal

challenges and budgetary deadlines that could threaten a government shutdown and unprecedented default in the months to come.

So GOP lawmakers, from Boehner and McCarthy on down, turned to Ryan, 45, the only figure in the House seen as having the stature, wide appeal and intelligence to lead Republicans out of the mess they're in.

"He'd be an amazing speaker," McCarthy declared to a bank of TV cameras after Republicans met behind closed doors to discuss their predicament. "But he's got to decide.'

Said Rep.

Westmoreland of Georgia, himself a potential candidate for the job, "He's the only guy who can unite us right now."

Not long after, Ryan rushed out of the Capitol, refusing to talk to reporters. With Congress heading into a weeklong recess, he was on his way home to Janesville, Wisconsin, to his

wife and young family. Ryan's spokesman, Brendan Buck. said: 'Chairman Ryan appreciates the support he's getting from his colleagues but is still not running for speaker."

Why not? Possible reasons include the presidential ambitions he may well still harbor. The speaker's post, highly prestigious and second in line to the presidency, requires a huge commitment of time and effort in corralling a party's House members. It is not on anyone's tactical roadmap to the White House. But Republicans were

determined to do what they could to get Ryan to reconsider. Rep. Darrell Issa of California said he carried Ryan's gym bag for him Friday morning in an effort to persuade him to run, and Ryan even fielded a call from his presidential running mate, Mitt Romney.

Romney later issued an effusive statement declaring: "Paul has a driving passion to get America back on a path of growth and opportunity. With Paul, it's not just words, it's in his heart and

The clamor for Ryan dominated Republicans' interest while Democrats watched with a mixture of fascination

and trepidation, concerned about the challenges just ahead for Congress. Several Republicans were quick to warn that despite

Ryan's popularity, he too could fall victim to the ferocious crosscurrents that telled Boehner and blocked McCarthy's ascent. "The same people who

wanted to take down John Boehner, who wanted to take down Kevin McCarthy, are going to want to take down the next guy, too," said Rep. Charlie Dent of Pennsylvania.

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

UH-Hilo to buy new teaching telescope

While it's not clear where it will be placed, University of Hawaii at Hilo still plans to buy a new teaching telescope after being told to remove its tiny observatory from Mauna Kea.

Decommissioning the broken Hoku Kea telescope was announced in July after Gov. David Ige, in response to protests that have blocked construction of the Thirty Meter Telescope, asked for the removal of at least three of the 13 telescopes on the mountain by the time TMT is built.

After several years of failed attempts by UH-Hilo to repair its 0.9-meter telescope, which was delivered inoperable, the news was almost devastating for astronomy faculty who were just about to buy a replacement and still hoped to

salvage the project.

But, after talks between faculty and university leaders, the \$450,000 state lawmakers already allocated to purchase a replacement will remain dedicated, assuming it's built anywhere other than Mauna Kea, faculty members

That was good news for Pierre Martin, an assistant astronomy

professor and Hoku Kea director. "For us, it's a very important

thing," said Martin, of having a telescope dedicated to students. "Our mission, our vision has not changed at all. This is what we want to do. But we need the tools to do that.

He said the new 0.7-meter telescope, which is being built by a separate company, likely will be delivered next summer.

The university also plans to make it available to local high school students.

Martin said the telescope and its 18-foot-wide dome temporarily will be installed at UH-Hilo if a permanent site isn't immediately

With Hilo's cloudy and wet weather, that's not an ideal location for a telescope, but students still could learn technical skills, such as how to install instruments and other equipment, he said.

Martin said a permanent location would need clear skies and be easy to access. He doesn't have a list of potential sites; he just knows where he can't put it.

"It's sad because this (Mauna Kea) is the best place, but we cannot do it," Martin said.

Mauna Kea is prized by astronomers for its clear skies and Native Hawaiians, who consider it one of their most sacred sites. Hawaiian activists, who see construction at the summit as desecration, have blocked grubbing and grading work at the TMT site several times this year, and construction remains on hold.

Removal of the existing Hoku Kea telescope and dome is expected to begin by 2016, officials have

The Caltech Submillimeter Observatory site will be returned back to its natural state by 2018. No other decommissioning plans have been announced.

Martin said the telescope's new dome will be lighter and more portable.

educational presentations by two founders of Hawaii regional cuisine, Roy Yamaguchi and Peter Merriman. any ethics bill is better

than none at all. But changes approved Wednesday for the fourth draft of the bill basically take it back to status quo, at least for employees acting as contractors.

Several council members have pointed out that one county employee, Randy Riley, the Automotive Division chief for the Department of Public Works, saves the county thousands over other contractors who bid for the same DPW drywell cleaning project. In a competitive closed-bid process, it shouldn't make a difference, they said.

"This all goes to open government and transparency," Wille said, not-

ing that the public would

now know about county

employees holding county contracts.

That information currently isn't collected, and the Finance Department has been unable to compile a list of county employees currently moonlighting on county contracts.

"We're happy with the majority of the changes," said Purchasing Agent Jeff Dansdill.

Other parts of the bill prohibit county officers or employees from representing private interests against the county or appearing on behalf of private interests before county agencies. And, the bill clarifies that county property, facilities, time, equipment and personnel can be used only for a public purpose, and not for private business or campaign purposes.

Nanawale murder suspect says Jay Z possessed his body

A man accused of slaying his landlord in Nanawale Estates almost three years ago said hiphop mogul Jay Z possessed his body at the time, according to two psychologists who examined the man to determine his fitness for trial.

Psychologist Dr. Duke Wagner said the rapper and music producer "has been a constant figure" in the world of 39-yearold Jason Russell Jump, accused of second-degree murder for allegedly bludgeoning James V. Johns, a 54-year-old wheelchair user, to death with a sharp instrument in a toolshed on Johns' Seaview Road property Dec. 16, 2012.

Wagner testified Friday in Hilo District Court that Jump said authorities should "put Jay Z in prison for the murder of James Johns and put other Illuminati who've been attacking (Jump) in prison, too."

The contested fitness hearing, requested by Jump's court-appointed attorney, Stanton Oshiro, is because examiners are split 2-1 in favor of finding Jump found unfit to stand trial fit for trial.

Jump, who is confined at Hawaii State Hospital, was present at the hearing. He didn't testify, but occasionally leaned over to talk to Oshiro during proceedings.

Wagner opined Jump is unfit for trial. He said Jump suffers from persecutory delusional disorder and said he doesn't believe Jump to be malingering, or faking symptoms of mental illness. "I think the consisten-

cy of psychotic symptoms and especially something that's delusional in nature, it's hard to maintain the nature, and, let's say, the exactness of the content," Wagner said. "People that are malingering are going to make mistakes as far as accuracy. They're not going to be consistent over years in remembering exactly what to say, to say it in a similar or the same manner and ... do this in a free-floating manner. He was consistent in that

District Judge Barbara Takase allowed Valerio to testify over the objection of Oshiro. Valerio testified Jump is, in his opinion, malingering, fit for trial and, over time, has voiced his

ly in sessions. He said he would use delusional physical complaints to ask for powerful opioid painkillers, such as morphine and Demerol. "He would say that

delusions less frequent-

celebrities are eating away at his stomach, Valerio testified.

Valerio and Jacobs both noted Jump took the same test before and after required legal fitness preparation courses at the hospital and passed the test before the course and failed it afterward.

Valerio said there are other patients in the hospital with messiah complexes, adding Jump doesn't refer to himself as

the "Son of Man" or the

"Chosen One" there. "If he did, he'd be one of four calling himself the 'Son of Man' on the ward," Valerio said.

Valerio also opined Jump was "intoxicated" on the video supplied by Oshiro and said Jump, while feigning schizophrenia, disparages actual schizophrenics in daily interactions.

"If he's hearing voices, why is he telling people to shut up?" Valerio

In addition, Valerio testified Jump is a "very good" chess player and skilled negotiator who sometimes demands Snickers candy for cooperating with

"He's very coherent; he knows what he's doing," the psychiatrist said.

Saudi crush was deadliest hajj tragedy ever

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates — One survivor of last month's crush and stampede at the hajj in Saudi Arabia recalled seeing so many bodies that he couldn't tell how many there were.

The Associated Press sought to answer that question, arriving at a death toll of at least 1,470. That made the Sept. 24 disaster the deadliest accident ever at the annual pilgrimage. And hundreds remain

The AP count is 701 higher than Saudi Arabia's official tally of 769 killed and 934 injured in the Sept. 24 disaster in Mina, a few miles from the holy city of Mecca.

Saudi officials, who could not be immediately reached for comment Friday, previously have said their tally remains accurate, although an investigation into the causes of the tragedy is ongoing. Authorities have not updated their casualty toll since Sept. 26.

The hesitancy to acknowledge a higher toll may reflect the leadership's reflex to clamp down on information as it struggles with multiple pressures. The kingdom is dealing with a war in Yemen, Russia's entry into the Syrian conflict and low oil prices that are straining the budget and the hajj tragedy is already opening it up to sharp criticism from opponents, particularly Iran.

The previous deadliest-ever incident at the annual hajj happened in 1990, when a

stampede killed 1,426 people. and shoving. The 36-year-old tragedies — the stamped and major danger at the hajj since it attracts more than 2 million pilgrims a year, all moving simultaneously in close quarters through a number of rituals over the course of five days.

The AP figure comes from statements and officials' comments from 19 of the over 180 countries that sent citizens to the five-day annual pilgrimage.

Authorities have said the crush and stampede occurred when two waves of pilgrims converged on a narrow road, causing hundreds of people to suffocate or be trampled to death

Mohammed Awad of Sudan told the AP at the time that he and his 56-year-old father were separated in the pushing under at least 10 bodies.

Iran says it had 465 pilgrims killed, while Egypt lost 165 and Indonesia 120.

India Others include with 101, Nigeria with 99, Pakistan with 93, Mali with 70, Bangladesh with 63, Senegal with 54, Benin with 51, Cameroon with 42, Ethiopia with 31, Sudan with 30, Morocco with 27, Algeria with 25, Ghana with 12, Chad with 11, Kenya with eight and Turkey with three. Hundreds remain missing, according to these countries.

Any disaster at the fiveday hajj, a pillar of Islamic faith, could be seen as a blow to the kingdom's cherished stewardship of Islam's holiest sites. This season saw two

Shiite-led Iran, the kingdom's top rival in the region, has blamed the disaster on the kingdom's "mismanagement" of the pilgrimage. The Islamic Republic also has called for an independent body to take over

Experts say there's no way that will happen. Patronage of Mecca and Medina is one cornerstone of the Al Saud family's legitimacy. Among King Salman's titles — as it was for his predecessors — is the Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques, referring to sites in the two cities.

The delay in announcing new figures may come from wanting not wanting to fuel

more criticism from Iran, or because of the kingdom's traditional top-down governance.


Despite Iran's sharp rhetoric over the deaths, other countries have been far more muted. That is likely due to Saudi Arabia's powerful influence, including years of patronage using its oil wealth, and because the kingdom can set the quota of pilgrims each country can send to the hajj.

"This is really unfortunate that in an event where people are dead, the families don't have any kind of transparency," said Madawi al-Rasheed, a visiting professor at the London School of Economics and Political Science's Middle East Center.

"Unfortunately for these Muslim countries, they are at a weaker position," he said, "and a lot of them worry about future pilgrimages, where they might not get the full quota allocated to them.

That kind of hesitancy about criticism has been seen in Pakistan. Earlier this week, Pakistan's Electronic Media Regulatory Authority sent text messages to executives at independent television networks, warning them that criticism of Saudi Arabia could be viewed as illegal under the country's constitutional prohibitions on affecting relations with "friendly countries."

But Saudi Arabia will maintain its "monopoly" over the hajj, even though it will likely face larger and larger crowds as time goes on, said Jon B. Alterman, a senior vice president at the Washingtonbased Center for Strategic and International Studies.

Scrapping Rebel Training Signals Obama Search for Syria Options

President Barack Obama's decision to shelve a controversial plan to train Syrian rebels is the latest sign that the White House is searching often fruitlessly — for options to scale back its involvement in a deadly and seemingly intractable conflict.

It also sends a message to Russia, Iran and U.S. allies in the region that the administration is making a renewed pitch to negotiate a political settlement for Syrian governance as the crisis there worsens, according to European and U.S. officials familiar with discussions.

The administration got tripped up in the cross-currents of the Syrian conflict by trying to create a fighting force to battle Islamic State out of disparate groups whose main aim was toppling the regime of President Bashar al-Assad, said Richard Murphy, a former U.S. ambassador to Syria and Saudi Arabia.

In announcing on Friday a narrower program to arm select leaders of Arab and Kurdish groups, the administration was acknowledging that there's little left of that

Doomed to Fail

Fred Hof, the administration's former special adviser for transition in Syria, said the original plan to vet fighters and train them outside the war zone to create a force targeted at Islamic State was doomed from the start.

The change in policy announced Friday is the administration's most recent shift on Syria, the role of Assad in any transition and whether to work with Russia and Iran to find a solution both to the civil war and the fight against Islamic State.

With Russia's entry in the conflict to support Assad's regime and the situation deteriorating, the only option left for the U.S. is getting negotiations under way, said a European diplomat, who asked not to be identified discussing private conversations.

In a small sign of improved communications, Pentagon spokesman Peter Cook said Russia has responded to a U.S. proposal for military-to-military contacts "to ensure safe air operations over Syria" and "talks could take place as soon as this weekend."

Initially the U.S. held the same position taken by Turkey, Saudi Arabia and Syrian opposition figures: Assad must go

ment can be formed. The rigidity of that position is now seen as one of the hurdles to a solution, the diplomat said.

Obama has begun to emphasize that Syria's government institutions could remain in place, provided that Assad eventually departs.

Reassuring Allies

At the same time, the administration is trying to reassure Turkey and other allies that their interests won't be left behind. Even the new, less ambitious program that still arms rebel groups shows regional allies like the Turks and Saudis that the U.S. is still committed to the opposition.

Hof, now a senior fellow at the Atlantic Council, says the scaled-back program may also be a way of "putting down a marker to the Russians."

While the U.S. and Russia say they agree on a need to counter Islamic State, Russian President Vladimir Putin has been using his military to prop up Assad, arguing that his departure would only empower the terrorists. U.S. officials have noted that most Russian strikes have targeted Assad opponents other than Islamic State, including some supported by the U.S. and its

The White House is putting Russia on notice that "we're not just abandoning the program, we're segueing to something else that includes people you may be targeting, so don't target them," Hof

Congressional Critics

Friday's announcement reignited criticism of Obama's approach to Syria from across the political spectrum in the U.S. Congress. Representative Eliot Engel of California, the

top Democrat on the House Foreign Affairs Committee, urged Obama to engage more, not less, to "prevent those who are fighting for a free Syria from losing all hope in American leadership."

The failed \$500 million "train-and-equip" program, designed to produce more than 16,000 fighters over three years, managed to graduate about 50 men. Pentagon officials have said that only "four or five" of them were actually in the fight against Islamic State at one point last month.

Christine Wormuth, undersecretary of defense for policy, acknowledged Friday in Washington that one of the "major challenges" the U.S. faced with the program was its limited mission, focused solely on the extremist group that has seized swaths of Syria and Iraq.

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

Here are 20 must-knows for Saturday's IRONMAN World Championship in Kailua-Kona:

No. 1: With more than 2,300 athletes registered to start the race on Saturday, this will be the largest athlete field ever at the IRONMAN World Championship in Kona.

No. 2: The race is 140.6 miles. The 2.4 mile swim segment begins and ends at Kailua Pier. The bike race travels north along the coast to Hawi, with athletes returning along the same route to transition. The marathon course travels through Kailua-Kona and back onto Queen Kaahumanu Highway. Athletes then run back into Kailua-Kona, coming down Alii Drive to the cheers of thousands of spectators at the finish line.

No. 3: The reigning world champions are Sebastian Kienle of Germany and threetime World Champion Mirinda Carfrae of Australia.

No. 4: Carfrae is vying to claim her third consecutive IRONMAN World Championship victory, a feat last accomplished by Chrissy Wellington of Great Britain in 2009.

No. 5: For the second year, the world championship event will feature separate age-group starts. The male pros kick off from Kailua Pier at 6:25 a.m., followed by the female pros at 6:30 a.m. The age groupers will start even later than in years past, with the male athletes starting at 6:55 a.m., and female age groupers at 7:10 a.m.

No. 6: If highly touted German pro Jan Frodeno comes in first on Saturday, he'll be the first athlete to win both Olympic gold and the Kona title.

No. 7: The overall course records are currently held by Australian athletes Craig Alexander and the regining champ Carfrae. Alexander set the male record in 2011 with a time of 8:03:56 seconds. Carfrae set the mark for the women in 2013 with a time of

No. 8: A pair of Americans hold the swim records. Lars Jorgensen holds the male mark for the 2.4-mile course with a time of 46:41 in 1998. In 1999, Jodi Jackson set the bar on the female side with a 48:43.

No. 9: Normann Stadler set the bike record in 2006 on the way to his second IRONMAN World Championship. He came in with a time of 4:18:23. Swiss athlete Karin Thurig is the women's record holder at 4:44:20.

No. 10: Mark Allen literally ran away with his first of six IRONMAN titles in 1989 with a 2:40:04 marathon. It is a mark that has stood for a quarter century. Carfrae set the run course record — again — in 2014 with a time of 2:50:26, besting her 2013 marathon by 12 seconds.

No. 11: With triathletes ranging in age from 19 to 85 having qualified to compete in the World Championship, the average age of 2015 age groupers is 43.2, well above the average age of professional triathletes at 33.7. The overall average age is 42.8.

No. 12: The United States is the most represented country with 768 competitors, accounting for nearly 32 percent of registrants this year. Athletes from 48 U.S. states are represented, with the greatest number coming from California (138), Colorado (54), Hawaii (49), Texas (44) and New York (44).

No. 13: Australia has the second-most athletes competing
